Summer is almost here - slow down and watch for kids playing outside!

Know the rules... Summer Safety Tips to teach children

From the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children

Below we've listed some basic summer safety tips to go over with your children. There's also an emergency contact sheet you can download at www.wbna.us => Safety => Kids Summer Safety Tips, fill in and keep on the fridge just in case of an emergency. It may seem pretty basic, but in emergency situations, children can have difficulty remembering their names and addresses, much less how to contact Mom or Dad. Better safe than sorry. We want everyone to have a safe, fun summer!

For Parents:

Be sure your children know the rules about whose homes they may visit when you're not home and know their boundaries - where they may and may not go in the neighborhood. Make sure children know their full names, address, and telephone numbers and how to use the phone. Be sure they know what to do in case of an emergency and how to reach you. (See info sheet) Children should have a neighbor or trusted adult they may call if they're scared or there's an emergency. Make sure they know who to contact and that it's okay to do so.

Rules for Kids:

- Always CHECK FIRST with your parents, guardians, or the trusted adult in charge before you go anywhere or do anything. Be sure to CHECK IN regularly so that someone knows where you are at all times.
- Always TAKE A FRIEND with you when playing or going anywhere. It's safer and more fun.
- Stay aware of your surroundings when outside. Don't crank up the music and focus on texting. Know where you are at all times and more importantly, what, or who, is around you.
- Stay SAFER when you're home alone by keeping the door locked; not opening the door for or talking to anyone who stops by unless the person is a trusted family friend or relative, you feel comfortable being alone with that person, and the visit has been pre-approved by your parents or guardians; and never telling anyone who calls that you're home by yourself. Say that your parents can't come to the phone right now and offer to take a message.

- Don't be tricked by people who offer you treats or gifts.
 Never accept anything from anyone without your parents' or guardians' permission.
- Never go alone to malls, movies, parks, or video arcades.
 Take a friend with you, and always CHECK FIRST with your parents or guardians to make sure it's okay and so that an adult knows where you are at all times.
- Be careful when you play. Don't play near busy streets or deserted areas and never take shortcuts unless you have your parents' or guardians' permission.
- Don't wear clothes or carry items with your name on the outside and don't be confused just because a person you don't know calls out your name.
- Never go into a public restroom by yourself.
- Don't get into or go near a vehicle with anyone in it unless you are with your parents, guardians, or a trusted adult.
 Never take a ride from anyone without CHECKING FIRST with your parents or guardians.
- Be careful playing or riding your bike as it gets dark. Wear reflectors and light colored clothing so that drivers are able to see you.
- Don't be afraid to say NO and GET AWAY from any situation that makes you feel scared, uncomfortable or confused. TRUST YOUR FEELINGS and be sure to TELL a trusted adult if anything happens to make you feel this way.

As the mother of a 9 and 12 year old, I am always looking for ways to avoid "Mom, I'm bored!" over the Summer. The following list highlights some of our favorite boredom-busters.

FREE! Relax at a natural outdoor amphitheater while you enjoy a music or dance show at Zilker Hillside Theater. This is one worthwhile trip to South Austin. The Zilker Hillside Theater is located in Zilker Park across from Barton Springs swimming pool (also a great Summer activity). The stage is located in a natural amphitheater under a stand of 100 year old pecan trees. Shows typically begin around 7:30 - 8:00pm and you can bring a cooler & snacks.

Kick it old school style at the Playland Indoor Skate Center in North Austin. Not much has changed here since I used to skate as a teenager in the 1980s. But my family always has fun grooving to the disco and current tunes and I like that we all work up a good sweat. Join in when they do the Hokey Pokey. Affordable prices.

Cool off at the Rock 'N River water park in Round Rock. My family discovered this gem a few years ago which is a great alternative to the pricey and crowded Schlitterbahn. It is located near the Dell Diamond on Highway 79 about 15 minutes from Wells Branch. With 2 slides, a lazy river, and multiple pools for young children, it's a good deal at under \$5 per ticket. You can also bring in your own cooler and snacks. http://www.roundrocktexas.gov/pools

Watch a movie at the IMAX theater at Bob Bullock museum. featuring Austin's only IMAX Theatre. This 400-seat, state-ofthe-art theatre makes your ticket really worth the price and 3D movies really do jump out at you. Current flicks include Tornado Alley & Flight of the Butterflies. FREE! Splash around at the Brushy Creek Lake Park. This park was named "Best Place to Play in a Fountain" by the Austin Chronicle. Let your kids run around the splash pad while water shoots up at them. They also have a playground, picnic tables, lake, and hike/bike trails. Located at 3300 Brushy Creek Road near the Parmer Lane intersection.

Tour the LBJ Presidential Library and Museum. If you are new to Austin, you may not know about this fantastic museum. It's an air-conditioned way to sneak in some education. Notable current exhibits include Texas Vietnam Heroes and 11/22/63. FREE ADMISSION on July 4th and August 27th (LBJ's Birthday). Hazardous Waste Collection Sees Record Breaking Numbers-WB ROCKS!

We had an incredible turnout April 13 for the combined Bulk Trash, Hazardous Waste, Habitat for Humanity, Easter Seals, Shredding, and Drug Take-Back event. 237 households came out with MANY making four and five trips! It was great to see everyone!

We filled two 16 ft. trailers (with side walls) and the back of a flat bed truck with hazardous waste, three and a half slide-off dumpsters with bulk trash, and the equivalent of another slide-off was collected for metal recycling. Habitat for Humanity packed their truck to the brim by 2pm and we filled the Easter Seals truck by 3:30pm. Ed & Kay Peterson made a final run to Salvation Army after we closed! They also took all the electronics collected to Goodwill for repurposing.

The first-ever WB Medication Take-Back program was a HUGE success! MUD Board President Donna Howe and her team of U.T. pharmacist students collected 75 lbs. of meds (approx. 15,000 pills) for incineration. The next Drug Take-Back is scheduled for October 12.

Another first! WB offered free document shredding. The guys from IESI/Progressive were wonderful! Very professional and courteous! We came pretty close to filling their truck with shredding. They even took the 37 lbs of pill bottles collected for destruction!

EXTRA Special Thanks to the WB MUD Board for allowing us to hold this event quarterly and for all of their support!! Thanks go out to Ed & Kay for coordinating with Habitat for Humanity and helping EVERYONE load their bulk trash, Habitat & Easter Seals donations and for sorting through it all. Many thanks to MUD Staff, Braxton & Fred, and Gus Kohn for loading the hazardous waste. Thank you MUD Board Director Tom Cheshire for signing folks in and getting them to the appropriate location, and Director Janet Maxey and MUD District Manager Shirley Ross for lending their support as well. Most of all, thanks to all the residents who came out and used these services!

Summer Sun Safety – Essential

in Central Texas Submitted by Pam Wachholz It's that time again, the kids want to be outside every daylight moment; the lawn begs for

regular attention; and the great pools and playgrounds are beckoning to be used. BUT, enjoying the summer outside leaves our skin vulnerable to one of the deadliest forms of cancer—malignant melanoma.

Did you know that every blistering sunburn received before the age of 18 drastically increases the chance of developing skin cancer? Well, now you do, and here are some tips to help prevent damaging sun exposure in both adults and children.

- •Stay out of the sun during peak hours (10am-4 pm)
- Protect children from the sun
- •Wear a wide brimmed floppy hat, the wider the better.
- Use a high SPF of sunblock (the higher the SPF the longer you have protection)
- Choose a sunscreen that has both UVA and UVB protection and apply liberally.
- Put your sunblock on indoors, 30 minutes before sun exposure
- When swimming or sweating a lot, pat yourself dry (rubbing will remove your sunblock) and reapply according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- When possible, wear light colored long sleeves & pants to protect skin.
- Wear UV-protective sunglasses to shield your skin and eyes from the sun
- Avoid Indoor Tanning

Minimizing your children's exposure to sunlight between 10am and 4pm and keeping them covered up when they are in the sun will protect them from future problems.

Again, scientists have found a link between childhood sunburn and skin cancer later in life. As teens and adults, we should all avoid exposure to radiation from sunlamps, tanning parlors, or other artificial tanning devices. Exposure to UV rays from any source can lead to skin damage.

So, let's all be smart and safer in the sun this summer as we enjoy all that our neighborhood and Central Texas has to offer!



ENJOYABLE DAY TRIPS

Visit Enchanted Rock in Fredericksburg. Your kids will love the feeling of climbing to the top of the rock. Enchanted Rock was designated a National Natural Landmark in 1970 and was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1984. The Rock is a huge, pink granite exfoliation dome that rises 425 feet above ground, 1825 feet above sea level, and covers 640 acres. It is one of the largest batholiths (underground rock formation uncovered by erosion) in the United States. The park reaches capacity and frequently closes on weekends (sometimes as early as 11 a.m.). http://www.tpwd. state.tx.us/state-parks/enchanted-rock

Relish 70 degree temperatures at Natural Bridge Caverns in New Braunfels. Only about a 45 minute drive from Austin, this cavern is one of the largest in the state of Texas, making it a top attraction. Take a day trip to the Mayborn Planetarium & Space Center in Killeen.

Have you seen our Butterfly Garden?

The Wells Branch MUD, CAMN (Capital Area Master Naturalists), and the American Heritage Girls (AHG) have been working hard over the past few months preparing the area north of the St. Andrews Church near Wells Branch Parkway for a new Butterfly Garden.

This project involves Wells Branch neighbors Shelley Palmer (CAMN) and her son Zaiah, Betsey and Steven Harper, Lisa and Kevin Ward (AHG parents), and AHG children, Tessi Harper, Sarah, Faith, and Grace Ward; along with boy power from Cole Harper and Liam Ward.

Involving CAMN and AHG kids in hands-on explorations of the natural world is essential if we are to create future generations who are able to undertake the vital tasks of re-establishing native plants and creatures. And what better place to start nurturing this than in our own neighborhood!

Why a Butterfly Garden? Butterflies are magical creatures and they evoke joy and fascination. I remember when I first moved to Texas, seeing fields of butterflies — Monarchs so thick they were like a carpet! Butterfly populations have seriously declined and are under threat, due mostly to destruction of their habitat and use of toxic chemicals.

We are providing the conditions to help butterfly populations bounce back, and what better way to get the kids involved than with a five year gardening commitment. Working together, the girls are creating their own butterfly friendly garden, in memory of Travis County Constable Pct. 2 Officer Kevin Aigner. The local AH Girls troop number is TX0240, which was Kevin's badge number.

To date, we have planted over twenty starter plants vital to attracting and keeping butterflies. Also, all of the plants the girls picked were native to support local and migratory butterflies.

What have we learned? The AH Girls were taught by Ms. Palmer that butterflies need host plants, caterpillar "hotels" where they feed and lay eggs. They learned they also needed nectar plants, or "restaurants" where adult butterflies can feast on nectar which will help prolong the butterfly's stay in the garden and draw in others. A protected water source, is also available via the creek.

What's next? As the plants grow, the group will begin labeling plants by name and adding a description of their usage (butterfly hotels or restaurants). Additional milk weed plants

will be planted over the next couple of months after they've germinated in starter pots.

So the next time you are out on the trails, we hope you'll take a moment to stop by enjoy Wells Branch's new Butterfly Garden.

As most of you have seen, the geese are gone from Mills pond. After the first and second round up of waterfowl, there was only one lone goose left. His name is "Baby G" and he is a cross-breed possibly between a Brown Chinese and a White Embden or Czech. He was younger and a bit more determined than the others and stayed away. This story is about him.

His mom tried for years to have goslings and made nest after nest on the side of Mr. and Mrs.

Berksan's house across from the pond. Over several years, she sat on various nests of eggs through times of heat and cold weather, covered them from predators when she needed nourishment and exercise, and had Papa Goose and Uncle Goose close by for help too. One morning in July 2011, she came off the nest to proudly show off her baby to the Berksans. They named him appropriately, "Baby G".

Baby G grew quickly and by spring 2012, the four were seen daily in Mills Pond. They are an unusual family, with mom in all white with an orange straight bill, and Dad and Uncle in a grey-ish coat with a black strongly developed basal knob on the upper side of their bills. After Baby G's parents were relocated to my fowl ranch in Elgin, Baby G told all the passing pond visitors that he was upset about it. Boy, did he have a lot to say on the matter too! He was lonely and left all alone. The crew from USDA put in a tremendous amount of effort trying to capture him, but Baby G was not going to have it.

I received a phone call from a very concerned trail walker, so I went to check on Baby G. I too was concerned by Baby G's mannerisms and vocal tones. He was really missing his family. This is the day I met the Berksans. We arranged to follow up to see what we could do to reunite Baby G with his family.

Thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Berksan, we were able to lure Baby G out of the pond, up the grass, to the side of the road, close to

his home. Within just a couple minutes of sweet-talking Baby G, we were easily able to pick him up and pet him. This was the first time in over a year the Berksans were able to pet him, and Baby G liked the attention. We gently caged him and I immediately drove off to Elgin.

It was dark when I arrived at the ranch. I opened the gate, pulled out the cage, and set Baby G free. He honked and honked again. In the distance, I heard a return honk, and then another.

Then out of the darkness, came three or four running, wing-flapping geese. Mom and Dad stepped forward, honking turned to excitement, this led to some head rubbing (goose hugs) between them and off they all went to roost. All in all, it was a happy reunion.

Since then, Baby G, has been inseparable from both parents, and his mom has a new nest with 3 eggs. Both Dad and Baby G stand guard. With 9 new goslings hatched in the past two weeks from our other geese, and more to come; next year, maybe Baby G will find his own soul mate and have a family of his own.Thank you Wells Branch for being passionate and caring about our water fowl.


