


Join your neighbors for the Annual WBNA Easter Egg Hunt

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Residents gather to create a Vision for Wells Branch

On February 25, around 50 residents gathered at the WB Community Center to dream and create a Vision for our community. This meeting was the brain-child of 12 year resident George Holcombe and new resident Scott Smith. The following was presented before the actual brainstorming began:

Reason for Visioning: To gather our vision from the community to use in planning and acting out the future.

What a Vision is and is not:

- A vision is not something we do or a plan of action
- A vision is an underlying image that motivates us, defines us, is a reason for being
- When we complain or boast about our community, we are making judgments based on our unspoken vision.

Why are Visions important: They are alive and dynamic - they move us - the clearer we are about our visions, the clearer our actions tend to be.

Once the purpose and examples were given, residents were invited to share what they felt were the gifts and challenges of our community. Mr. Holcombe and Mr. Smith facilitated the rest of the session encouraging residents to participate and collaborate to build a rational chart. Below is the result.

Glance at the Past - Recent MUD Accomplishments

Operating expenses have been reduced over \$350,000 through 1. Restructuring: reduced overtime, consolidated customer service and weekend two-man crew, 2. Negotiating new electric rates for District accounts as well as new cell and landline phone rates, and 3.

Saving costs by modernizing the vehicle fleet and by declaring excess equipment surplus.

Trees for Trails has been implemented, beginning with adopting a master plan, removing invasive species, and completing three tree plantings already. Funding for this plan is supported by single stream recycling.

Implemented Green initiatives include single stream recycling, updated pool heaters, modernized pump station equipment, rainwater harvesting and irrigation system repairs (including well monitoring), a new air conditioning system for the Rec Center, a new thermostat for the CC, and the acquisition of an electric ATV.

Enhanced security patrols complemented security camera installations at critical facilities and neighborhood crime watch programs were supported as more neighborhoods became involved.

Repairs on the CC roof have been completed and the Annex roof has been replaced. Also, the Rec Center counter and office space were remodeled for better efficiency.


The Wells Branch Community Church has been moved to a larger venue at the Rec Center.

Certain recreation programs were enhanced (including a Zumba class) as the registration/membership tag renewal process was improved.

MS4 drainage system regulatory requirements were implemented along with comprehensive pond and stream assessments.

A strategic water/wastewater master plan was developed. Improvements were made to the disc golf course: added holes and signs, painted baskets.

Under trail system maintenance: all wood bridges were repaired concentrating on storm damage. Benches, tables and trash receptacles were replaced as needed, and faded signs in KF Park and other areas were replaced.

The 3rd Annual Keep Wells Branch Beautiful - Don't Mess with Texas Trash-Off Cleanup event will be held on April 14th in conjunction with the annual Dog Days Dog Fair at Katherine Fleischer Park.

Cleanup efforts will be from 10am - 2 pm. Volunteers from local neighborhood associations, civic organizations, businesses, industries, scout troops, youth groups, church groups, and other community organizations, as well as individual citizens, are welcome to participate.

Coordinating the removal of hazardous and bulk material.

Safe Driving in OUR Neighborhood By Deputy D. Pierce, Travis County Motor Division

One of our neighbors, Joy Hall Bryant, had a great idea for a series of articles on common traffic questions. Passing a School Bus or Not

Texas Transportation code 545.066 states:

An operator on a roadway, when approaching from either direction a school bus stopped to receive or discharge students: Shall stop before reaching the bus when the bus is operating visual signal, (flashing red lights visible from 500 feet in normal sun light) and may not proceed until; the bus resumes motion, the operator is signaled by the bus driver to proceed, or the visual signal is no longer activated.

An operator on a roadway having separate roadways is not required to stop. Separate roadways means there is an intervening space on which vehicles are not permitted to drive, a physical barrier, or a clearly indicated dividing section constructed to impede traffic. A roadway only separated by a turn lane is not considered separate.

That being said, if a bus stops on a street like Wells Port all traffic must stop. A street similar to Wells Branch Parkway, only traffic on the same side of the roadway with the bus must stop. A roadway like FM 1325/Burnet Road all traffic must stop.

The total fine including court cost for passing a school bus with lights activated is \$605, up to 1 year in jail if the driver causes serious bodily injury and a state jail felony if a person has been previously convicted.

Current Issues & Concerns

Nothing new on the home front for W2A Road Acceptance or the Affordable Housing project behind Willow Run. Please check our website (wbna.us) periodically for updates.

RRISD Update: On February 16, RRISD Trustees voted to move children north of Merrilltown and west of Bratton to McNeil High School . Students currently enrolled in Cedar Ridge will be allowed to continue there thru graduation. Bus service to both campuses will be provided.

WB Resident, Michael Farris, met with Superintendent Jesus Chavez on February 24. He was told by Dr. Chavez that he would grant a transfer to any Wells Branch child that is currently attending Chisholm Trail Middle School, or will be going next year, thus allowing a path to keep RRISD Wells Branch students together through elementary, middle and high school. It is not known at this time whether any transportation services will be provided. Please check our website for updates.

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Help keep ALL of our property values UP T

Keeping up the outside of your home is important not only because it's a condition of the covenants in most sections. but because it helps us all maintain our property values and keeps Wells Branch beautiful.

We need to be proactive to ensure our neighborhood doesn't decline. As we all know, that one yard, or home, that isn't maintained can bring down the whole street. We have a responsibility to our neighbors as well as ourselves to take care of our homes, yards and fences.

Everyone's yard suffered from the drought last year. Most of us have lawns to replace; some have lost trees and shrubs. It's important that we clear out the debris from our yards as this only detracts from our homes and neighborhood, and in some cases, increases the chance of rodent infestation. As the temperature climbs, the less likely we are to take on the big projects. Please take advantage of the cooler temps now and get your yard ready for summer so that it only requires routine maintenance when the heat hits.

The MUD has free compost available for pick up at the Rec. Center on Shoreline. It's self-serve so bring a shovel and containers. They ask that you limit it to four 20-gallon containers at time so that everyone has a chance to get some.

Take a look around - if your whole street needs some work, why not make a party of it? One neighborhood watch group plans a clean-up day each spring and fall. Neighbors gather at one house for coffee and donuts and then go house by house helping each other get their yards in shape. They finish with beer and barbeque at another neighbor's house that evening. It's a great way to knock out the work and build a sense of community with your neighbors. To participate in the curbside yard waste recycling, please place clippings in open containers (round black tubs) or the recyclable brown paper bags available for purchase at home stores. TexaScapes WILL NOT pick up grass cuttings or leaves in plastic bags. Branches should be cut in 6ft lengths and bundled together.

As the weather gets warmer, this type of recycling increases dramatically. Clippings should be placed curbside by 7am Monday morning. Some weeks, it may take TexaScapes two or three days to collect all the clippings throughout the neighborhood so please be patient.

Drought recovery options for landscape and lawn By Richard D. Fadal, ASLA and "The Green Gardener"



The prolonged drought has wreaked plunder on many a traditional and native landscapes throughout Texas while stressing our water distribution systems and forcing limited outdoor water use. By contrast, recent winter and spring rainfall throughout our immediate area now has all surviving

trees, shrubs, perennials, lawns, native grasses, wildflowers, and weeds bursting into growth. Yet Lake Travis remains well below normal levels and leaves us with an uneasy feeling about what's to come and once per week outside sprinkler system watering limits.

What's one to do about the condition, recovery, and future of their home landscape? It would take several volumes to completely answer that question, however I would like to share the following "Highlights" as possible options that may get you started enough to research further and pull your home landscape back together, weather pending of course.

Do not rush to the nearest rock yard and place gravel and cacti everywhere! Central Texas is not and will never be a part of the Sonora Desert. Droughts come and go, however our historic average rainfall of 28 to 38 inches will make such a landscape a washed out weedy mess.

Major loss of trees, shrubs, and lawns is a very strong hint for one to consider adopting a completely new concept of landscaping their property.

Creating a more sustainable landscape with the ideal balance of native & adapted trees, shrubs, perennials, bunch grasses, pathways, patios, decks, smaller lawn areas, and even a vegetable garden area can result in a much lower maintenance and water requiring landscape. Choosing this option will require you to obtain extensive and professional information concerning ideal soil mixes, proper soil depth (8 inch minimum and over 12 inch best), appropriate plant materials & grasses, landscape design concepts, practical irrigation - rain harvesting - and watering methods, and basic landscape construction techniques. Start by researching the many good articles and books on Native & Adapted Plant Design for Central Texas, The Principles of Xeriscape, Green or Sustainable Landscape Design, City of Austin Grow Green Guide and/or attend some local seminars at nurseries or the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. This type of landscaping will survive most severe droughts while thriving under normal rainfall conditions.

If your landscape has faired fairly well but has some dead trees and plants and the lawn areas have pretty much crashed there are some possible options for recovery.

First remove all obviously dead trees and plants, then cutback any desirable but real stressed shrubs and perennials down to a 2-4 inch stem. Replace the missing plants with only native and adapted plants that you carefully select for your situation from the Native and Adapted Landscape Plant Guide of the City of Austin's Grow Green program (it's available at most local nurseries or can be found at www.growgreen.org).

Manually pull or chop the weeds from the landscape beds; a Hula Hoe or some of the newer weeding tools may be useful. Incorporate about an inch of good finished compost into all landscape beds and tree rings by light cultivation with a 3-prong hand cultivator, adding some of the new rain and water holding granules that are soon to be on the market. Then maintain one inch of mulch throughout the year, lightly cultivate it so that it remains loose enough to absorb water. Fertilize those landscape beds and trees using an organic or organic based fertilizer like Medina Hastagro or a similar made granular.

Be sure to water thoroughly and deeply.

The lawn is the number one water user within any land-scape, so give serious consideration to reducing its size to some pleasing shape in locations where you must have grass. Completely dead areas are a way the drought has shown you insufficient grass growing areas; possibly shallow rock outcrops, poor soil, shallow soil, compaction, heavy shade, or the wrong kind of grass. Maybe those areas would be better suited for mulch, groundcover, or planted beds; or for a patio, vegetable garden, path, swing set or garden shed.

Whatever amount of lawn one decides to keep, the following recovery and maintenance practices will help. Start mowing once or twice per week to control and weaken the winter weed growth and hand pull or chop out what you can. For overwhelming amounts of weed growth hire the services of a Texas Licensed Pesticide Applicator certified in Lawn and Ornamental Plant applications. They are trained to get good results while safely applying products you would not want to touch. Many home applied weed killers end up harming desirable trees, plants and pets.

Next or simultaneously, remove all completely dead grass and rake any dead grass or clippings from remaining living grass areas. Lightly cultivate bare areas adding finished compost to the top two inches of soil and lay sod or spread new seed of a similar but more drought tolerant grass variety. Tamp any seeded areas to make good seed/soil contact or lightly cover the seed with compost. Finally the complete lawn area should get a good organic or traditional lawn fertilizer, about ¼ to ½ inch topdressing of finished compost (as thin as one can rake with the backside of a steel garden rake). Finally, water it thoroughly and deeply, keeping it moist until the new grass seed or sod takes, even if you have to lightly hand water.

Be sure to keep the following recommendations in mind if completely replacing or installing a new lawn. Use well drained topsoil that is a sandy/sandy loam texture with about 10% organic matter (it might be compost you add). Be sure to grade the soil so that is has positive drainage away from the house, drive, and other improvements. Make the total soil depth as deep as you can afford and preferably 8 inches minimum. That depth holds water best, allows grass roots to reach a minimally optimal depth, but also is just deep enough to create hydrostatic pressure within soil particles that pulls any rain or applied watering into the root zone. Select a newer and more Central Texas suitable grass variety that is more hot summer tolerant, such as Sahara, Panama, or Princess

Bermudagrass seed for full sun; Celebration Bermudagrass Sod for full sun and light/medium shade; Palmetto St. Augustine for soil depths over 8 inches and morning sun to medium shade; with Amerishade St. Augustine possibly working for light to deeper medium shade. Consider planting some well spaced lighter foliated deciduous trees such as Texas Cedar Elm, Honey Mesquite, Possum Haw, or Texas Persimmon as a shady and cool break throughout the lawn

Good luck, hope these options help, and keep dancing and praying for normal rains and a full Lake Travis.





Spring into a Fitness Routine

The American College of Sports

Medicine (ACSM) sets exercise recommendations for individuals of varying fitness levels. In general, one should set a goal of 20-60 minutes of continuous aerobic activity, however severely deconditioned people may benefit from multiple short 10 minute sessions per day. Three to five exercise sessions per week are suggested for persons with a moderate to high fitness level.

Beginning a new fitness routine is always a good idea, however I caution you to listen to your body to prevent injury. Your body may not be quite ready for what you expect it to be. Injury may ultimately cause a sudden halt to your newly acquired exercise regimen. Set realistic achievable goals using the minutes and frequency guidelines above. Progress slowly. And of course, have fun!

Check your irrigation system before Spring - proper maintenance saves both water & money

- Check your system before it is activated this Spring and then at least once a month
- Make sure the water sprays only on landscaping, not sidewalks, streets, etc.
- Adjust the run time on the automatic controller based on changing rainfall and temperatures
- Make sure the spray pattern is not blocked by shrubs or grass
- Check each nozzle head in each zone to make sure they are spraying correctly and that they are not clogged with dirt or debris
- Check for indication of a leak; this may be an area that stays wet or is greener than the rest of the lawn.


