Art at Bratton's Edge - Community Meeting By Debby Thompson, WBNA President

The WBNA received notice February 18 of intent to build a small affordable housing complex on the five acre lot at the corner of Long Vista and Bratton Lane (across from Willow Bend Pool).

Everything is tentative at this point as they will not receive notice of approval or denial on funding before the end of July. Sale of the property is contingent upon approval. The developers have expressed a desire to work with the community and have requested a neighborhood meeting so that they may answer any questions you may have. This meeting has been scheduled for March 27, 7pm, at the Community Center.

I hope that each of you will bring your questions to the meeting along with a measure of restraint. Please remember that it only takes one *NIMBYist comment to discredit our entire neighborhood. If approved, this development, its owners, and its residents will all be our neighbors. Bridges burned now, may be very difficult to repair down the road.

You must be registered to vote in order to be eligible to vote in this election. If you are not yet registered, you must do

so by April 10. Wells Branch Community Library has Voter Registration Forms available. WBNA will have a Voter Registration Table at the Water Why\$ in Wells Branch event at the Rec. Center on March 22 from 11am-3pm and at the Friends of the Library Garage Sale on March 29 from 7amnoon if you need to register or file an address or name change before the election.

Early voting for this election is April 28 – May 6 and election day will occur on Saturday, May 10, 2014, where you will have the opportunity to vote from 7 am to 7 pm. As of press time, polling locations had not yet been published. Watch wbna.us for updates.

Proposition addresses safety, growth, technology, aging facilities and more

The Pflugerville ISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously to accept the Citizens Facility Advisory Committee's recommendation to call for a \$287 million bond package addressing district growth, safety and security, and campus parity across the district. The bond election will be funded within the district's existing tax rate and will create no change to the existing tax rate. Election day is May 10, 2014.

On Tuesday, February 25, the Round Rock ISD Board of
Trustees unanimously called for a bond election to be held
May 10, 2014. Voters will be asked to consider a bond package totaling \$299 million that addresses growth, health/safety, technology, and capital renewal and replacement projects.

Three propositions will appear on the ballot:

Proposition 1 - \$234.2 million to address growth, health/ safety, capital renewal and replacement, and technology refresh

Proposition 2 - \$25.9 million to expand technology access and additional capital renewal and replacement

Proposition 3 - \$38.9 million to build two fine arts venues

The district's debt tax rate has fluctuated between \$0.296 and \$0.3722 over the past 10 years, with the current tax rate of \$0.3275 per \$100 in assessed value home. The projected tax rate for the 2014-2015 tax year is approximately \$0.3487. A home valued at \$100,000 after homestead exemption will see an annual increase of around \$21.30 or \$1.78 per month and a home valued at \$200,000, \$3.55 per month or \$42.66 annually.

Round Rock ISD will host five public forums in April to give community members an opportunity to learn about the propositions and currently proposed projects of the 2014 Bond.

April 29, Stony Point High School Lecture Hall, 1801 Tiger Trail, Round Rock

WB Disc Golf News By Brian Litke

The Waterloo Disc Golf Club, in partnership with the Wells Branch Disc Golf Club, held the Waterloo 14th Annual Ice Bowl at the WB Disc Golf Course February 1, 2014. Ice Bowl events are held across the US each winter with a mission of raising funds to fight hunger. The Austin-area Ice Bowl is typically held at Zilker Park, but that course was under renovation and unavailable. 122 players came to play the Ice Bowl at WB, and the event raised a record \$1,375 plus 437 pounds of food for the Capital Area Food Bank! These are the best figures for Waterloo's Ice Bowl ever in both cash and amount of food.

I feel honored that Waterloo DGC asked Wells Branch to play host to the Ice Bowl this year, and I thank the Wells Branch MUD for their assistance with tent and table setup. I look forward to playing a remodeled Zilker course for next year's 15th Annual Waterloo Ice Bowl!



It's My Park Day - March 1, 2014
29 volunteers helped out at "It's My
Park Day 2014" at Wells Branch Disc
Golf Park, including a group of 5 Girl
Scouts and their two leaders who were,
of course, the hardest workers. Thank
you to everyone who helped out,

including WB MUD staff Brandon and Braxton!

The volunteers planted 4 trees, including a 10-year old Live Oak and several smaller trees: a Chinkapin Oak, a Mexican Plum, and a Texas Redbud. Volunteers picked up 12 trash bags of litter, most of it from the undeveloped lot across from the course, spread lots of mulch to protect tree roots from soil compaction and drought, added topsoil and mulch to an area scoured root-bare by the recent floods, and added trunk protection sleeves to several young trees. The hard workers were treated to a free Austin Parks Foundation T-shirt, KIND bars, apples from Wheatsville Co-op, Chipotle coupons, and free wildflower seeds.

Beyond the trees and mulch, the real impact of "It's My Park Day" is that it gives citizens a feeling of pride and ownership of their park that makes them feel protective and supportive of the greenbelt. For instance, they'll be less likely to tolerate litter or others who litter. When we all lend a hand, even just one hand at a time, we can make great things happen in our community.



What is your water IQ?

March has been dedicated to water conservation in Wells Branch. Being mindful of our water use will become more relevant sooner than we think. With our primary sources of water



distribution limited and overburdened, we will be forced into being innovative with capturing all water resources, and in our consumption. Here are some tips for the kitchen from the Austin Water website. Please join us on March 22 & 23 to learn more about water conservation (see insert).

- Install a low-flow aerator on your kitchen faucet. Free aerators are available to all Austin Water customers. For more info, visit http://www.austintexas.gov/department/free-showerheads-faucet-aerators
- When washing dishes by hand, don't leave the water running. Fill one sink or basin with wash water and another with rinse water.
- Scrape food from plates instead of rinsing them before washing. Newer dishwashers and detergents get dishes clean without needing to pre-rinse.
- Wash fruits and vegetables in a bowl or basin using a vegetable brush instead of letting the water run. Then use the wash water to water your plants.
- Don't use running water to thaw frozen foods. Thaw them overnight in the refrigerator or use the defrost setting on your microwave instead.
- Chill drinking water in the refrigerator instead of running the faucet until the water gets cold.
- Cook food in as little water as possible and put a lid on the pot. This will also help food retain more nutrients. Use water left over from cooking foods like pasta and vegetables to water plants.
- Start a compost pile or scrape food into the trash instead of running your garbage disposal. If you must use your disposal, save food scraps and only run it once a day to reduce water use.
- If you have a dishwasher, use it rather than washing dishes by hand. Efficient dishwashers use as little as four gallons per cycle.
- Run only full loads in your dishwasher.
- Use one glass for drinking water each day or refill a water bottle to cut down on the number of glasses that need to be washed
- Soak pots and pans instead of letting the water run over them while you scrape.
- If you drop ice cubes from the freezer or have cubes left over after finishing your drink, don't throw them in the sink. Put them in a plant instead.

If you are shopping for a new dishwasher, purchase the most efficient model feasible. The Consortium for Energy Efficiency has developed a list of energy- and water-efficient dishwasher models. Visit their site at http://www.cee1.org/content/frequently-asked-questions

Check your irrigation system

- proper maintenance saves both water & money by Margret Wingrove, Crossroads Utility Services

Irrigation System Maintenance

Irrigation systems need to be checked to make sure they are working properly and efficiently. Faulty systems can greatly increase your water bill and contribute to unhealthy lawns, plants and shrubs. Before the system is activated for the Spring and Summer seasons, here are some maintenance recommendations for checking your system.

Controller Box:

Clean out cobwebs and dirt

Check wiring for loose connections

Change batteries

Check time and date of watering cycle. Make sure that it is programmed to follow the District's voluntary watering schedule.

Odd Addresses = Saturday & Wednesday Even Addresses = Sunday & Thursday

Automatic Irrigation Systems = Before 10 AM

Hose-end Sprinklers & Soakers = Before 10AM or after 7PM

Remember, the Spring months require less water that the hot Texas summer months.

Sprinkler System:

Before running the system, remove the last sprinkler head in each zone and run the water for a few minutes to flush out any dirt and debris. Replace the head .

Activate the system and check to make sure that all heads in each zone are spraying consistently. Low pressure could indicate a broken pipe as well as a zone not coming on or turning off prematurely. There should be an even flow of water from each head with no bubbling or spurting.

Check each head to make sure it is popping up correctly and that it is not leaking or covered with debris. Grass may need to be trimmed to allow the head to operate properly.

The head should be adjusted to spray on the landscaping, not the street, sidewalk or driveway.

A monthly check of each sprinkler head should be performed throughout the watering season.

Adjustments to the watering cycle should be based on changing rainfall and temperatures throughout the year.

Birding in Wells Branch: The Sounds

There is nothing like seeing an early Bluebonnet or smelling the grape-like scent of a Mountain Laurel for your brain to let you know that it's spring. What about the sounds of spring? For me it's hearing the liquid, gurgling warble of Purple Martins. I close my eyes and I am transported to my childhood listening to the lovely sound of dozens of those sleek members of the swallow family occupying our neighbor's Martin houses.

The cacophony of Great-tailed Grackles always reminds me of my days at UT in the early 80's, where thousands of them ramped up their whistling and chuckling to a seriously loud level as spring rolled around. They were so loud that it scared me! Both of these birds are frequently seen around many areas of Wells Branch contributing to our springtime background sounds.

On our Wells Branch birding walks in February and March, there have been as many as 70 American Wigeons surveyed at Mills Pond making their "whew whew whew" whistle. By April they will have made their northward migration. Another sweet sound of spring is hearing a chipper chatter and looking up to see a "flying cigar" shape of the Chimney Swift.



Recycle - Repurpose: It's Up to Every One of Us to Help! By Kay Peterson

As many of you know, the WB MUD hosts a Bulk
Trash Day on the second Saturday of each month. In
October of 2012, together with the WBNA and
MUD, Ed and I started the Hazardous Waste/Habitat
and Easter Seals Collection Day. In April 2013, the
Drug Take-Back, Document Shredding, and Metal
Resale programs were introduced. Next, Dianne
Koehler came on board and offered repurposing of
Fertilizers/Pesticides out of her home in conjunction
with our quarterly efforts in October of 2013. On April 12,
we'll be adding e-cycling to our event as well. This has been
a huge community endeavor; we're very proud of how it continues to grow.

QUARTERLY (Jan/Apr/Jul/Oct), you can drop off paint, paint thinner, oil, anti-freeze, batteries, paper, cardboard, reusable clothing and electronics, old TVs and broken electronics, metal, and even Styrofoam for recycling/repurposing. Twice a year (April/October), we feature drug take-back and document shredding.

Great progress has been made in reducing the amount of trash going into the landfill. Each quarter at least two 16-foot



trailers with hazardous waste are collected, one slide-off with metal and two filled-to-the-brim Easter Seals and Habitat for Humanity trucks. A LOT of people are doing a great job.

On the flipside however, there are usually three or four slide-off dumpsters that are filled just with trash at each monthly bulk trash disposal day. Many recyclable items such as shoes, clothes, paper, cardboard, Christmas trees, etc. are going

into the dumpsters when they could be repurposed.

If we don't recycle and/or reduce the amount of waste we produce, our level of pollution will only continue to grow; we are going to pay for it one way or another.

If you currently recycle, WE THANK YOU for making the world a better place. If you don't, we ask you to reconsider and give it a shot. Use your blue recycle bin; take items to Goodwill, Easter Seals, or Habitat, save your items for the quarterly collection day. There's a place for almost everything you want to get rid of besides the dumpster. It's up to every one of us to help. Thank you!

Door to Door, Telephone & Internet SOLICITATION By Sgt. Craig Smith #978 Travis County Sheriff's Office

Not long ago, door-to-door sales was a common practice. Vacuum cleaners, magazines, Tupperware and encyclopedias could all be purchased from your friendly door-to-door salesman. We saw it almost daily and it did not seem out of the ordinary.

Today, the lower prices and convenience of large stores and the internet have put the majority of door-to-door salesman out of business. While most businesses rely on other ways to sell their product, there are a few that still utilize door-to-door sales. Landscaping and alarm sales seem to be the most common, followed by scouts and school children.

I encourage you to always be careful when dealing with a door-to-door salesman. They should be dressed professionally and have identification clearly displayed. They should never ask you to provide any personal information. It is always safe to accept literature that they provide, however, giving them any information is very risky. Any professional organization will understand and expect this. They will be willing to provide you with information and then allow you the opportunity to research their product and make an educated decision. It's your choice to even speak with a door-todoor salesman. You have the right to ask them to leave at any time. Once again, any professional organization will respect your request and move on. If you feel something does not seem right or if a salesman pushes you for any personal information, please close and lock the door and call the Sheriff's Office so that we can investigate.

Telephone solicitation has become a popular form of fraud. Have you ever received a telephone call and had a spokesman ask you to donate money to their organization? Most people simply laugh and hang up the phone, but believe it or not we work many cases where bank account numbers are given so that funds can be transferred. The spokesman promises that the money is for a donation or that you have received a prize, but you need to cover the shipping costs first. Once that account number has been given, it's too late. You have to think that if a person calls one hundred people in an hour, they only need a few "donations" to achieve a very good hourly rate! As before, I encourage you to never give any personal information over the phone. A professional organization will simply give you their information so that you can do the research and make that educated decision. The phone call that promises you a prize or money, and seems to good to be true, is too good to be true and is only a scam! Most of these scams prey on the elderly and ask for an account number to withdraw a small donation. Usually, after the account number is given, as much money as possible is withdrawn within minutes. Never, ever give personal information of any kind over the phone to someone that you do not know.

Cybercrime has become the most popular form of fraud. It is achieved by internet solicitation, credit card theft and identity theft. Unfortunately, there is a large amount of cybercrime that you cannot control. Target had a security breach in

December that leaked thousands of credit card numbers. This type of crime is far out of our hands. You can, however, take some steps to protect your assets. As with all other solicitation, never give any personal information over the computer unless you are dealing with a known source and you are on a secure connection. Emails are not typically secured so do not put account numbers and/or personal information in the text. Keep an eye on your credit score and watch for unauthorized accounts or loans. Keep your credit cards safe and watch your statements. Report any unauthorized transactions as quickly as possible to your bank and to the Sheriff's Office.

Yard Waste Reminders

To participate in the curbside yard waste recycling, please place clippings in open containers (round black tubs) or the recyclable brown paper bags available for purchase at home stores. TexaScapes will not pick up grass cuttings or leaves in plastic bags. Branches should be cut in 6ft lengths and bundled together.

As the weather gets warmer, this type of recycling increases dramatically. Clippings should be placed curbside by 7am Monday morning. Some weeks, it may take TexaScapes two or three days to collect all the clippings throughout the neighborhood so please be patient.

Free Mulch

As a courtesy to residents, the WB MUD provides free mulch for pick-up at the Rec. Center on Shoreline. Please check in at the desk before loading your vehicle and limit yourself to four of the "Green Gold" containers (black tubs) so that all residents may have the opportunity to utilize this service.
