
NATIONAL NIGHT OUT Tuesday, October 5, 6:30-9pm, Gazebo at KF Park

Come find out what's going on in our community and visit with local law enforcement officers about what you can do to help prevent crime in Wells Branch.

National Night Out is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness, generate support for and participation in local anti-crime efforts, and to



strengthen neighborhood spirit and law enforcement-community partnership. But, its primary goal is to send a strong message to criminals to let them know the Wells Branch neighborhood is organized and fighting back. Take a stand against crime. Turn on your porch light and come join your friends and neighbors at the park for food and fellowship. If you have a Neighborhood Watch group on your block (or even if you don't) we'd like to encourage you to come eat dinner with us, listen

STOP THE IRRITATION! Submitted by Derek Hamilton, OD, Therapeutic Optometrist

Central Texas is known for it's beauty AND for allergies. The fall allergy season is in full swing -- and for chronic sufferers, this means itchy, red eyes! Seasonal allergies are nothing new to those of us who live in Austin, and often our eyes are affected.

In the eye care industry, this is referred to as allergic conjunctivitis and is characterized by tearing, redness, runny nose, and almost always itching. So is there any hope for the seasonal allergy downtrodden? Yes! Consider the following tips to get you through this itchy time of the year. The first and simplest method of dealing with eye allergies is to dilute the allergen. Allergens are bits of organic matter that float in the air and cause the body to respond with inflammation. These allergens are typically small particles like dust and pollen. The best way to dilute an allergen in the eye is with an artificial tear. I recommend that allergy

sufferers start with an artificial tear three or four times per day. These drops can be purchased at any drug store and contain no medicine. They simply lubricate the eye's surface and help to wash out the allergens. Some of my favorite brands are Blink, Systane and Optive.

Another simple and natural way to find relief is with cold compresses. Many people find that when eye allergies get really inflamed – the best way to put the fire out is with cold. I tell my patients to fill a zip top bag with ice cubes, wrap the bag in a damp washcloth and hold it over the eyelids for about two minutes each. This is an easy and effective way to relieve really inflamed eyes. In addition, there are a number of new pharmaceutical therapies for the treatment of allergic conjunctivitis. Zaditor (ketotifen fumarate) is an over



the counter eye drop that I often recommend to my patients. The drug in Zaditor has two methods of action. It blocks histamines and it stops mast cells - one of the main cell types responsible for allergic reactions. This drug is used twice a day and has an immediate response.

I generally recommend that my patients use this drug for a couple of weeks when they are having problems. As with any medication, if you choose to use Zaditor remember to closely follow the instructions on the label. Stronger drugs are available by prescription.

If you feel that you need something more potent, I recommend that you visit your eye doctor. Remember that many other serious eye problems cause red eyes. Whenever you have a red, irritated eye, you should be seen by your eye doctor to be evaluated and treated. If you are one of the many suffering from allergic conjunctivitis, consider trying some of the suggestions above. The bottom line is that there are many therapies to deal with allergic eyes. You don't need to live in agony!

FALL GARDENING REMINDERS Submitted by Dianne Koehler



It's finally cooling down a bit and we'll be able to get out in our yards and gardens again to take care of things before winter. All the rain we received at the beginning of September was a blessing. Let's just hope it continues. After a hot dry summer, our

grass, trees and shrubs need the rain to better tolerate the winter cold.

I have been consulting the Central Texas Gardener's website (http://www.klru.org/ctg/) and a number of other websites for lists of "what to do this month." I also browsed the catalog at the library for books to help keep the yard and garden in order so here goes.

September / October is the time to:

Divide & Transplant: Amaryllises, Callas, Cannas, Daylilies, Irises, Liriope, Wood Ferns, and crowded perennials. Dig and store caladium bulbs. Dust with fungicide.

Add to your compost pile with fall leaves and yard debris; shred well with lawnmower. Replenish mulch in beds. Prepare and plant fall vegetable beds. Seed some wildflowers and perennials.

Plant Vegetables: Beans, Peas (English & edible pod), Summer Squash, Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Chinese Cabbage, Collards, Garlic, beets, carrots, and radishes. 1st frost date is mid November. All the kale family will do well far into the winter with a bit of protection. Keep an eye out for cabbage loppers/ treat with Bt.

Watch for brown patch in St. Augustine turf as temperatures cool. Treat late in September and again in 3 weeks with Terraclor or Daconil.

Watch for blackspot and mildew on roses and treat. Control fall webworms on trees with Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt).

Remove dead and damaged wood from shrubs and trees.

Trick Poinsettias into holiday bloom: Beginning on the fall equinox (September 21/22) they need about 14 hours of dark per day through Thanksgiving to bloom for the holidays. Consult the experts for the whole process.

(Just one more thing that makes WB GREAT!)



You must be aware of the potential risk of crime in your home in order to prevent it. First...Remember that the key factor in most crimes is OPPORTUNITY. IF THEY CAN'T GET AT IT, THEY CAN'T TAKE IT! Then...follow a regular plan of home security to deter

the potential burglar or other intruder.

• Use a timer or photo electric cell that automatically turns a living room light on at dusk, particularly if you are going to be away at that time.

•Leave a radio on with the volume turned low when leaving home, even for short periods

•Always close and lock garage door, including the inside door!

•Secure automatic garage door opener in the glove compartment of your car when leaving car parked outside of the garage (out of plain sight!)

•Secure all obvious (and look for the not so obvious) points of entry to your home. Pretend you are the burglar...stand outside your home and plan how you would get in; then install secure locks on all doors and windows

•Lock up all ladders, ropes, or tools that could help a burglar gain entry

•Keep all shrubbery trimmed near your doors and windows – don't provide concealment or climbing platforms for the burglar

• Brightly illuminate all entrances, preferably with vandal-proof fixtures

- Keep your grass cut, your leaves raked, etc.,
- to indicate a well cared for and occupied home
- Empty your mailbox or arrange to have it
- emptied as soon as mail is delivered

• Install new locks when moving into an apartment or previously owned home

•Keep extra keys out of sight and in a safe place; never hide a key outside-most hiding places are obvious to burglars

• Avoid displaying valuable items near windows with open drapes or shades

•Never leave a note on the door explaining why you are not at home

• Never leave doors or windows unlocked

• Display only your last name on your nameplate or mailbox

•Start a "buddy system" with your neighbors in order to watch each other's homes

•Watch for "movers" or "repair people" at a house where no one is home

Law enforcement officers are available to meet with individual Neighborhood Watch Groups and train members on a variety of topics, including: home security measures; recognizing suspicious activity; describing and reporting events, vehicles and persons; telephone security; and confrontation with intruders.
