
National Fire Prevention Week Oct. 7-13

The reality is that when fire strikes, your home could be engulfed in smoke and flames in just a few minutes.

It is important to have a home fire escape plan that prepares your family to think fast and get out quickly when the smoke alarm sounds. What if your first escape route is blocked by smoke or flames? That's why having two ways out is such a key part of your plan. This year's theme, "Have 2 Ways Out!", focuses on the importance of fire escape planning and practice. Basically, have two known exits in any establishment that you may reside or visit, plan for emergencies and practice responses.

Many fire departments encourage people to change the batteries in their smoke detectors when they change their clocks because Daylight Saving Time provides a convenient reminder.

- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half.
- Almost two-thirds (62%) of reported home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

(Atlantic Housing) has made application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for the issuance of Tax Exempt Mortgage Revenue Bonds and Housing Tax Credits. 

"Keeping it Local" by buying Wells Branch, increases revenue for the library and fire districts by increasing sales tax generated within the districts. With the purpose of growing community and merchant involvement, the Friends of the Wells Branch Community Library (FoWBCL) and the Emergency Services District No. 2 (ESD) met with Wells Branch business owners in August to form a new group: the Wells Branch Merchants Association (WBMA).

The WBCL and the ESD derive a substantial amount of their total revenue from ½% sales tax within the districts. It is to their advantage to support and promote "shopping local" so that neighbors support businesses within the district whenever possible. A meeting was held August 31st at the Library at which six businesses within the WBCL & ESD No.2 districts were represented. We think that was a great turnout for a Friday afternoon before a holiday! Another meeting is proposed to include more businesses in the district for planning and organization.

Garden Guild is Grand!

With goodies out of our gardens, lots of conversation and good planning, we have an exciting year ahead of us. Here's the report from our August planning session.

The WBGG met with 17 gardeners and discussed the accomplishments of the guild; what worked and what didn't work in their gardens this past year. The garden tour was by far the most outstanding accomplishment. The sessions on shade gardening, Daphne Richard's session on gardening in the drought, and Joe Posern's session on drip irrigation also made the list as well as an increase in the number of organic gardeners and xeriscaping of yards in the community. The biggest successes for vegetables were Valley Girl tomatoes, heir-loom seeds and certain varieties of cucumbers. The biggest problem was growing yellow squash and preventing borers from killing the plants.

September brought an outstanding session on *Preparing for the Fall Garden* with Jim Pfluger from Green & Growing in Pflugerville and our first plant swap. We had a fantastic turnout! Link to the highlights through www.wbna.us/gardening-in-wells-branch/

October will feature: *Growing Herbs* and another plant swap 30 minutes before the meeting.

Toxin of the Month: Bisphenol A

During a Green Team sponsored event for the Wells Branch Parent Teacher Association, I was approached by Debby Thompson to write a column for the Neighborhood News. Mrs. Thompson considered a "Toxin of the Month" column an invaluable and informative asset for the newsletter to increase environmental awareness regarding potential threats to human health and the environment in our homes and places of business in Wells Branch.

Working on the old adage that knowledge is power, I will begin the column with a simple, yet concerning, statistic. There are more than 80,000 chemicals that are sold in products at present. Of these 80,000 chemicals marketed to consumers, approximately 200 chemicals have been evaluated for safety in terms of risk assessment to human health (Clean Water Action, 2012). This is an alarming knowledge gap as many chemical compounds are associated with increased incidence of cancer, asthma, and additional human health effects.

This month, I would like to focus on Carcinogens, Mutagens, and Reproductive Toxicants (CMRs). My introduction to such compounds began in my risk assessment class at the Medical University of South Carolina. A course reading highlighted the danger of endocrine disruptors, human-made chemical compounds that are hormone mimickers, chemicals that mimic and replace our natural hormones, bioaccumulate, and are stored in human and animal tissue over time. Some people may ask why this is dangerous? These chemicals are associated with the increased risk of early onset puberty and obesity, Type II diabetes, hyperactivity, prostate cancer, sperm defects, and impaired reproductive development (Patisaul, 2010).

The individuals most at risk are pregnant women. The developing fetus is extraordinarily sensitive to shifts in hormone levels of the mother, which can alter the "genetic blueprint" of the baby (Colborn et al., 1997).

There are several pathways for endocrine disruptors to enter our environment. Because effluent from factories that produce these compounds are dumped into global waterways, these compounds are found in the global water supply, and often the highest levels become concentrated at the polar environments because of the water current circulation. These are geographic areas and ecosystems that we like to consider "pristine". We, as a population, have less control over the contaminated global water supply, and we rely on the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA), and the global equivalents of this program, to regulate industry to maintain a clean water supply.

Yet, as consumers, there are ways to protect ourselves. By knowing what the chemical compound is and in what products it is located, then we can reduce our exposure to these toxic chemicals. One known endocrine disruptor is Bisphenol A or BPA. BPA is a compound that is used to make polycarbonate plastic. BPA is a compound that is found in baby bottles, infant formula linings, water bottles and plastic linings of canned goods. BPA is marked by the recycling number of 7.



By steering clear of this plastic for food and water consumption, then you can reduce your exposure to BPA. By not purchasing plastics made of BPA, then you might reduce the likelihood of these chemicals finding their way into our environment and global water supply.

Knowing what these toxins are, and how to reduce exposure, is critical to improved environmental quality in the home. For more information on endocrine disruptors, please consider visiting the following websites:

Practical Ways to AVOID BPA

Now that you know the science on why it's best to avoid BPA, you may be wondering how you can best prevent contact with the toxin.

Although the public is becoming

Although the public is becoming increasingly aware of the dangers of BPA, many retailers still use this

toxic chemical in their products, including receipts, linings of pizza boxes/microwavable popcorn, linings in canned food, and many plastic products. Here are a few tips to help avoid BPA exposure:

Try to avoid plastics. When puzzling over the small recycling numbers on the bottom of plastic containers, remember this mantra: 4,5, 1 and 2; all the rest are bad for you. So AVOID 3,6 & 7!!

Find an alternative use for those plastic baby bottles and use glass ones instead.

Check the EWG guide to infant formula and baby bottles. (www.ewg.org)

Check the toxicity level of your child's toys on www.healthytoys.org.

Avoid putting plastic containers in the microwave. They leach toxic chemicals, including BPA into your food.

Do not buy pre-bagged popcorn as it has BPA in the lining that leaches into your popcorn as it cooks. Buy organic popcorn kernels, put ¼ cup in a brown paper lunch sack and microwave for about 2 minutes. Voilá – you have much healthier popcorn and you can add whatever toppings you want!

Use cloth bags instead of plastic bags for shopping.

Contact your local representative to encourage your city to ban disposable plastic water bottles. Use a stainless steel, glass or BPA free water bottle!

Ask your grocery store/retailer to use receipts without BPA in them.

BPA has been linked to several health maladies, such as cancer, infertility and other hormonal issues. It is best to be avoided as much as possible. By following the above tips, you will greatly reduce your exposure to BPA and its ill effects.

RESIDENT SPOTLIGHT Dianne Koehler: Energy, Drive, Passion & Hard Work.....



This month's issue features Dianne Koehler, one of the original residents of Wells Branch. It's hard to know where to start with Dianne; she's been involved in our neighborhood since its inception and has given so very much to our community. This article doesn't begin to cover all of

Dianne's contributions to Wells Branch.

Let's start at the beginning. Dianne has always been good at "firsts". She was on the original committee that petitioned Pflugerville Fire Department to establish a station in Wells Branch, originally located on Thermal where the MUD maintenance office is today.

She served on the community center committee and walked the neighborhood gathering signatures for a petition to build the Community Center on Klattenhoff. Her forethought and drive helped bring this meeting place, which is used by the entire community, to fruition.

Together, Dianne and Rosewitha Bowker (with ideas from Dale Cockshutt) formed the WB Community Garden committee and worked together to get the garden started, establishing the plan to include the tool shed. Countless Wells Branch residents have enjoyed the opportunity to grow organic vegetables in plots close to home all because of their initial efforts.

Dianne was also one of the early WBNA board secretaries and newsletter editor and continues to share her wisdom with the community today through her gardening blog.

In the early days of Wells Branch, she served as the Homestead Board President on the first board past the developer for 8-9 years, working with the board to get historical recognition for the Gault Homestead and the marker for the property. While on the board, she worked on projects such as the garden construction at the Homestead (the raised stone beds encircling the fence around the cabin), increasing traffic to the facility so that our treasure might be shared, the Homestead Festival, and starting the homestead summer camps with Paula Cockshutt which eventually grew into "Stuff-to-do" camp.

In recent years, her passion for gardening led her to help create the Wells Branch Garden Guild, spreading the word on organic gardening and helping neighbors expand their knowledge and abilities through her expertise. Dianne continues to serve on the steering committee for this important community service group.

Dianne also volunteers her time with the Wells Branch Elementary Jr. Master Gardener Project. She served as a teacher during its initial year and will be sharing her skills and love of gardening with the children again this year.

Always a supporter of our parks and trails system, Dianne managed a fund raiser in 2011 for Trees for Trails and conducted an art & science mini-camp program in 2012 with 50% of the gross proceeds going to buy trees for our park system. She's also a member of the new MUD sponsored "Stream Team" helping to plan for the future of our parks.

Her love and talent for teaching continued to manifest itself through volunteerism with scouting groups in the Wells Branch area, teaching special classes and merit badges over the years. Dianne has influenced Wells Branch in so many ways, but she will most be remembered for bringing the library to Wells Branch. Dianne was a founder of the Wells Branch Community Library. She built it from the ground up starting with the petition drive (going door to door in her house slippers) on through the election establishing the tax district culminating in the design and construction of the building that houses the library (with many others). She served on the board for 12 years, 10 of those as president, many years as finance officer, and on the tech and finance committees as well. Dianne worked tirelessly for the WBCL, volunteering in excess of 20 hrs/week during several years. She donated hundreds of dollars for events to secure matching funds and staff perks in the early years. Teaching a oncea-week family art class, Dianne initiated the pumpkin painting program and a Christmas ornament program that not only paid for themselves but raised money for programming. In addition to the weekly art/craft activities, she helped start a summer mini-camp program as a fundraiser and conducted an art & science only program for several years.

One of the founding members of WBCL's first book club, Wine, Women & Words, and proud owner of Library Card "#1", she remains a vital part of our library community today.

Outspoken and not always tactful, Dianne has always been willing to fight for what she believes in, and she believes in Wells Branch. She's one of a kind and we wouldn't be where we are today if she hadn't been here from the beginning. Thank you Dianne, for helping to "Make Wells Branch Great!"
