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Home Safety for the Holidays

As you prepare to celebrate the upcoming holidays, we encourage you to put safety at the top of the gift list. One of the best ways to show your family and friends how much you love them is to make their safety (and your own) a high priority. The following tips cover some of the most common

fire and emergency medical calls during the holiday season:

COOKING SAFETY

Thanksgiving is the #1 day of the year for home cooking fires, followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve. Unattended cooking is the top cause of these fires and fire-related deaths. Other common injuries are burns related to spills, splashes, or steam from hot foods. So what can you do to keep your busy and sometimes crowded kitchen a place of joy during the holidays?

Stay with the Stove: Always stay in the kitchen whenever you are cooking on the stovetop to watch the food. Keep the handles of your pots and pans turned back away from the edge of the stove so they aren't knocked or pulled down. Even when the stove is off but especially when it's on, keep the area around the stove clear of flammable items such as hot pads, paper towels, cookbooks, decorations, and notes/cards. Never leave your house unattended when you have food cooking in the oven – not even a ham or turkey.

Keep Kids Back: Always keep children at least 3 feet away from a hot stovetop. Move knives well out of their reach. Don't let them too close to hot dishes or liquids such as gravy and coffee.

Use a Timer: It's easy to forget you have the stove or oven on, especially once you sit down to enjoy your feast. Set a timer to remind you to turn things off.

Caution with Cords: Be sure cords from electric knives, coffee makers, plate warmers, and mixers are not dangling off of the counter. Adults may accidentally snag these dangerous items, and children may be tempted to pull them down.

KNOW THE RISKS OF TURKEY FRYERS

Turkey fryers use a lot of cooking oil at high temperatures, and there is a significant danger that hot oil will be released during cooking. Additionally, the burners that heat the oil can ignite spilled oil. To reduce the risk of a turkey fryer catching your home on fire, only use it with great care on a flat surface in the open, well ventilated outdoors.

CHRISTMAS TREE SAFETY

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 1-2" from the base of the trunk.
- Add water to the tree stand every day.
- · Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving your house or going to sleep.
- Make sure the tree is located at least three feet away from any heat source, and it isn't blocking an exit.

LIGHTS, CANDLES, AND DECORATIONS

- It is against both Fire Code and Electrical Code to use temporary electrical power (such as extension cords) or to display holiday lighting for more than 90 days.
- When hanging holiday lights, use clips not nails to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged. If you need to use a ladder, work with a partner on the ground.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for the maximum number of light strands to connect.
- Some lights are only safe for indoor or outdoor use, but NOT both.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn. Locate them away from windows and doors so exits are not jeopardized if they catch fire.
- Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach ideally up high in a locked cabinet and don't leave them or pets alone in a room with a lit candle.
- Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed.

Holiday Safety Tips

by Debby Thompson, WBNA President & WB Neighborhood Watch Coordinator With the bustle of the holidays just around the corner, make sure you're taking every precaution possible to keep your home and family safe and secure. We usually see an increase in opportunistic crime this time of year; please remain vigilant

Keep your blinds and drapes closed when away, even if only for a short period of time.

Keep your house well lit at night (backyard included). A motion sensor activated light is an inexpensive deterrent.

If your Christmas tree is displayed in front of a window, **don't pile the presents around it**. Store the gifts in another area away from view when the blinds or drapes are open.

Do NOT put the empty boxes for the new computer, TV, stereo system, etc. on the curb for the trash. Take the time to break down every box and put it inside your trashcan/recycling bin so that it is concealed, even if you have to hold it over to the next week. People start cruising our neighborhood on Sunday afternoons to see what has been put out. The less they know about what you have inside, the better.

Door-to-door solicitations increase tremendously this time of year. Always look out the window or peephole before opening the door or answering a knock. Never open the door all the way, especially if you have a Christmas tree and/or presents in plain view.

Always lock your car. Never leave your car running unattended or leave your keys in the car or ignition. If you usually keep a garage door remote control in your car and don't park it in the garage each and every time you return home, hide the remote or take it inside. Thieves check visors and this gives them instant protected access to your home.

Keep your garage door closed at all times and keep the inside door from your home to the garage **LOCKED**.

Don't leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Take them in the house or put them in the trunk out of sight **BEFORE** arriving at your destination.

While shopping this holiday season, **remain aware of your surroundings at all times**. If unsure of your safety, ask a store attendant to have security walk you to your car. You can't be too safe. This goes for trips to the grocery store as well. When unloading your car at home after a day of shopping, lock it between trips to and from the car.

If you plan to be away:

Let a neighbor and/or block captain know you'll be out of town and when you'll return. They should have the following: your emergency contact information; contact information for anyone with access to your house (pet sitter, etc.); when they should be expected; what they look like and a description of their vehicle(s).

- Let only those who **NEED** to know, know when you are going out of town.
- Don't share vacation plans on social media.

- Arrange to have your lawn cared for if you are going to be away.
- Don't hide keys under doormats or flowerpots or in similar places.
- Put your lights, stereo or TV on timers.
- Keep your house well lit at night (backyard included).
 A motion sensor or photocell activated light is an inexpensive deterrent.
- Leave a car in your driveway (yours or neighbors')
- Don't cancel your paper or mail deliveries; ask that your neighbor pick them up every day.
- Leave a key with a friend or neighbor; ask that the house be checked at regular intervals.
- Store all your valuables.
- Consider asking friends or relatives to live in your home while you are away.
- Ask your neighbor to put trash in your trashcan and to put it out for collection and away when they put theirs away.
- File a Close Patrol Request. The filing of this form alerts patrolling officers so that they may pay close attention to one's residence. To do so: Contact the Travis County Sheriff's Office at 854-9721. Ask to make a Close Patrol Request. You will be asked for information on those

- caring for your home while you're away make and model of their vehicles, name, description and times they should be at your home.

- If you are not already, become a Wells Branch

 Facebook for community updates. The more community
 involvement and connectedness there is, the safer we

- Join the community listserv aka 'The Google Group' by sending your name, physical address and email to wbneighbors@gmail.com.
- Most of all, be aware of your surroundings and look out for your neighbors. If you see or hear something suspicious, call 911. The Sheriff's Department would much rather answer a false alarm than deal with a tragedy later.

We live in a **GREAT** community **AND** a **SECURE** neighborhood. Let's all do our part to keep it that way. **Here's to a safe and happy holiday season!**

This program provides assistance to underprivileged children and their families in Travis County and Senior residents of local retirement centers in Travis County.

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It happens all too frequently...that car parked in the accessible space with no plate or placard. Or you come out of the store only to find that someone has parked in the access area next to an accessible space. But what to do about it? You can confront the driver, but these days, that's a dangerous proposition and never ends positively. And getting a police officer there before the violator leaves is unlikely. But now there is an easy way to address the issue in a positive, proactive way.

Accessible parking violations are more than an inconvenience. It's the number 1 threat to the health, safety and community access for people with disabilities. Parking Mobility, an Austin based nonprofit organization, puts the solution into the hands of those directly affected. "Before Parking Mobility I got so frustrated about disabled parking violations. Now I can be a part of the solution." Renee Lopez, Parking Mobility Volunteer.

Parking Mobility provides a free smartphone App that allows anyone to report violations quickly and easily. Using the Parking Mobility App takes as little as one minute, is discrete and provides much needed data to address the issue.

And if you become a Parking Mobility volunteer in Hays or Travis County, your reports are processed by local law enforcement partners and a citation is issued (mailed) to the owner of the offending vehicle. The person cited can pay the fine or be offered an opportunity to take an educational alternative that teaches them about the importance of accessible parking spaces and the laws protecting them. This program has proven to reduce accessible parking abuse by as much as 80% in less than two years.

'Tis the season to water wisely

Wells Branch residents can save money year-round by conserving water during the winter wastewater averaging period beginning December 12, 2016 and ending March 13, 2017.

There are no meters on customers' wastewater lines. To determine wastewater usage, a customer's water usage is reviewed over three consecutive, low demand winter months when lawn watering and irrigation are less frequent. The customer's wastewater charge for future billings will be based on the new wastewater average or actual monthly water usage, whichever is lowest. The usage during this time frame determines the wastewater charge each month from April 2017 to March of 2018. Now is the time to make sure that there are no leaking faucets or running toilets!!!

Customers who pay their water bill to Wells Branch Municipal Utility District (MUD) may contact Customer Service at Crossroads Utilities at 512-246-1400 or CustomerService@ crossroadsus.com with any questions. Out of District customers who buy their water directly from the City of Austin, should call 512-494-9400 or check http://austintexas.gov/ department/wastewater-averaging for more information.

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Leave the Leaves by Rebecca Johnson, ISA Certified Arborist

Ahhh fall, when the days get shorter, the nights get crisper and ... leaves start falling off the trees. This is the time of year when the silence is broken by the sounds of leaf blowers starting up and blowing leaves out of yards and into the streets. What if there were a better way to deal with leaves?

The National Wildlife Federation is encouraging people to leave their leaves where they fall. In a blog post on their site (bit.ly/dontrakeleaves) they state that fallen leaves are really important habitat for many beneficial insects and wildlife, including salamanders, box turtles and toads. In the podcast "Trees Are Key - Fallen Leaves are Key" (bit.ly/takfallenleaves), Paul Johnson extols many of the virtues of fallen leaves for soil amendment.

Many years ago, I was a devoted reader of *Organic Gardening* magazine. The Editor in those days often referred to SPBs - stupid people bags. SPBs are the bags of leaves that people put out for trash pickup. He and his wife would sometimes go out late at night and grab the bags of leaves to use in their compost bin and as mulch around their plants. Here in Wells Branch, the bags of leaves are taken for composting, so they don't end up in a landfill and go to waste, but they would be even more beneficial if they were used where they fell.

My yard is non-turf, I have drought tolerant ground cover rather than grass. When leaves fall off my trees, they disappear into the ground cover and serve as mulch over the winter and as an important source of nutrients in the spring. I haven't fertilized my vard since I moved and my plants always look amazing. However, I know many of you really value your lawns and a heavy carpet of leaves isn't a look you find attractive. If you can stand to have them on your lawn for a short while, run your mower over them to shred them and they'll break down fairly quickly. If you just can't stand having them on your lawn, instead of using a leaf blower to blow your leaves into the streets, where they become a nuisance for your neighbors and clog our storm drains, blow them onto a tarp and use them in your compost. Or, you can put the gathered leaves in a heavy duty garbage can and use your weedeater to shred them and use them as mulch around your trees and shrubs. A four inch layer will break down amazingly quickly and will help replace many of the nutrients your trees and shrubs used over the summer. If you still have more than you can use (lucky you!) put them out for the compost trucks.

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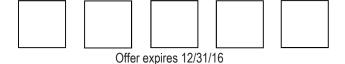

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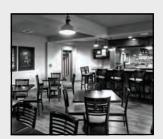
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WB Photo Club Update by Margaret McGhee-Sufke

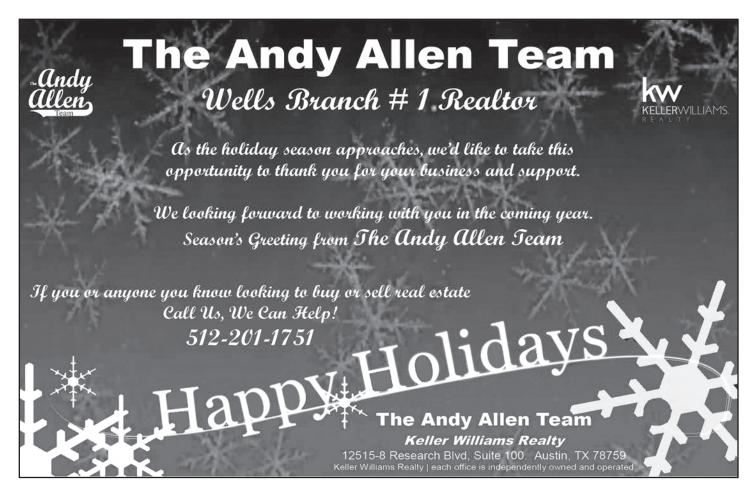
Wells Branch Garden Guild by Dianne Koehler

Ten Simple Tips for Successful Winter Bird Feeding

As it gets colder you can make a huge difference in the care of the birds that live and migrate here by what you feed or "don't feed" them for the winter. For instance: **DO NOT FEED THE MIGRATING DUCKS ON THE POND** so that they can leave healthy enough to make the long flight back to their other home.

Backyard bird feeding can make a real contribution to their survival and even help them to thrive during the winter months. Here are ten pointers for a successful winter bird feeding season:

- **1 Put out feeders with good size capacity:** And/or use multiple feeders to provide ample food.
- **2 Provide nutritious winter seed foods:** For most birds these often include seed mixes of black oil sunflower seed, hulled peanuts, niger seed and white millet seed.
- **3 Offer fatty food too:** Birds need to burn more calories in the winter just to stay warm. Suet is considered a high energy food because it consists of fat that has 9 calories per gram compared to 4 calories per gram for carbohydrates or protein. Peanut Butter is also popular with our flying friends. Suet feeders are a favorite of woodpeckers and other insect-eating birds.
- **4 Keep your feeders full:** Winter birds need to stock up on calories especially for those long, cold winter nights.

- **5** Be consistent and keep feeding through the winter: Birds grow accustomed to your feeders especially in severe weather when the snacks you offer may mean their very survival.
- **6 Remember water:** Birds can become dehydrated in winter even if surrounded by ice and snow. Putting out a pan of water near the feeder on warmer days is a terrific idea.
- **7 Care for ground feeding birds:** Ground-feeding birds such as dark-eyed juncos, doves and many sparrows will be able to gather up the seed that drop from the feeders.
- **8** Hang feeders in cat-safe locations: Place bird feeders in locations that do not also offer hiding places for sneak-attacks by cats and other predators. Think of placing the feeders ten to twelve feet from shrubs or brush piles. This gives the birds some time to react.
- **9 Remember feeder cleanliness:** Feeders will need to be cleaned with some hot water and dried a few times during the season.
- 10 Save some money and stock up on seed: It is best to stock up on birdseed in the Fall when many lawn and garden centers are discounting it to make way for winter merchandise. Stored properly, (in cool dry places) seed can easily last for months, particularly seed mixes and sunflower seeds.

Transportation Forum Update

The WBNA would like to thank the residents that came out for the Transportation Forum held on November 10 at the WB Community Center. Travis County Traffic Planning and Texas Department of Transportation were present to discuss their plans over the next 30 years. The meeting was live streamed, so if you missed it, you can always watch the video on our Facebook page. In addition, presentations from both Travis County and TXDOT are available on the WBNA website under the Construction tab.

Travis County has a survey to help them develop their transportation plan through the year 2045. The survey can be accessed at www.surveymonkey.com/r/tctranplanb if you would like to provide your input.

The Texas Department of Transportation is holding an **Open House on December 6** at Walnut Creek Elementary from 5:30pm to 7pm. TxDOT will have maps and personnel on hand showing the currently proposed designs for the I35 stretch between Louis Henna Blvd/SH45 and Grand Avenue Pkwy. The currently proposed changes are estimated to cost \$3.2 million and be completed winter 2019/2020 (pending funding).

The Open House will also have maps for the proposed changes at the Parmer Lane and I35 intersection. The proposed cost for these changes is \$25 million and proposed to be completed summer 2020 (pending funding). There are also proposed changes for the Wells Branch Parkway / I35 / 1825 intersections; however, these changes will NOT be presented at the Open House. The proposed cost is \$31.6 million and estimated to be completed summer 2022 (pending funding).

If you cannot attend the Open House, but want to see the changes, TxDOT will also have a virtual Open House from December 6 – 20 at www.mobility35openhouse.com. You can also sign up for updates from TxDOT at www.my35.org/capital.

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
