Plan Ahead for Fireworks Safety

Please respect your neighbors if you choose to light fireworks. This year, July 4th falls on a weeknight when many families will be working the next day. Keep in mind that the sound of fireworks can be very stressful for some veterans

and others who experience Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). It also scares many dogs and other pets.

Remember that fireworks are NOT legal to use on or around schools and Travis County parks. They're also not legal on Wells Branch Municipal Utility District (MUD) property, which includes all MUD facilities, parks, trails, greenbelts, the Pond, drainage detention areas, the veloway, and the grassy area located at Robert I. Walker and Charla Circle.

But if you choose to light fireworks in a safe, legal location, Travis County ESD No. 2 (Pflugerville Fire Dept.) wants you to better understand the dangers of fireworks and work together as a family to stay safe. Rather than risking your safety with personal fireworks, we strongly recommend checking out a professional fireworks show. A great option in this area is the 4th Fest in Wells Branch! Here are other safety tips for your family:

Make Fireworks a Family Activity

- Before the holiday, make a point to discuss fireworks safety with everyone in your family to decrease the chance of someone getting hurt.
- Never let children purchase fireworks without parents there — even older kids.
- Insist on adult supervision whenever fireworks are being lit

 even for older youth. Children age 10 to 14 years old
 actually get the second-most number of fireworks burns
 and injuries, right behind preschoolers and toddlers!
- Kids who are younger than kindergarten-age should never be allowed to hold any fireworks on their own, including sparklers. Sparklers reach temperatures of 1,200 degrees, which is hot enough to melt metal. Give little kids glowsticks instead. Pass the sparklers to much older kids and adults to carefully light ONE at a time ideally wearing gloves.

Preparing to Light Fireworks

- Only light fireworks OUTSIDE on a flat surface that's far from any homes or buildings. Don't light fireworks near dry grass or leaves – you can catch them on fire.
- Before you light a firework, take a good look around to be sure there aren't any people or pets in range of possibly getting hurt.
- Don't lean over firework devices or place your hand over them when lighting. Immediately back up as far as you can after lighting! The body parts that suffer the most fireworks injuries are fingers, hands, eyes, face, and ears.


Safely Disposing of Fireworks

 Don't try to re-light fireworks that didn't work on the first try! Leave them alone, then thoroughly soak them in water with a bucket or hose before you try to handle them. • Double-wrap ALL fireworks in plastic before throwing them in the trash. The same is true for a firework you find sitting on the ground that looks like it's been used. It may still be active and could re-ignite in your hand or pocket.

NOTE: Fireworks are poisonous to pets. Symptoms may include vomiting, a painful abdomen, and bloody diarrhea. Be sure not to leave behind any used fireworks where pets (yours or someone else's) spend time.

Remember to Stop, Drop and Roll

TEACH children and REMIND adults to Stop, Drop, and Roll with their eyes covered if their clothing or hair catches fire. NEVER run or walk around if on fire! After the fire on the person is put out, remove any burned clothing then wrap the person in a clean, dry blanket to keep them warm until help arrives



New Google Group for Cyclists



In May, the WBNA hosted a meeting with the Public Works division of the City of Austin regarding urban trails, bike lanes, sidewalks, and plans for connectivity to ETJ areas (Wells Branch). A basic overview of the current systems in place and what is planned (Urban Trails, Tier I

& Tier II and forecast timeline for safe overall connectivity for Wells Branch and far North Austin, off road where possible was presented.

Our neighborhood has invested heavily in our trail system, but the MUD can only affect trails within its boundaries; we're isolated here and cannot easily and safely connect to any other trail system. Coordination of central authorities (Travis County, COA, MUD) to develop plans to connect our neighborhood with other communities would be ideal.

Our goal for this meeting was to find out, as residents in the ETJ, how can we impact the plan and where to start. Mark Johnson and Joe Wieck have taken the lead in this effort and have started a Google Group for Wells Branch Cyclists with the idea of using it as a place to focus ideas on how to improve cycling facilities in and connecting to Wells Branch.

Municipal Annexation Reform in the Texas Legislature by Joe Petronis

While your mailing address is Austin, you do not technically live within the city limits of Austin. Wells Branch Municipal Utility District (MUD) is a political subdivision located within Austin's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ). Wells Branch MUD has its own board of directors that is in charge of water, trash, trails, pools, facilities, and other levels of service. The county and Emergency Services District provide basic services such as police, road maintenance, and fire protection.

Currently cities can annex areas that are in its ETJ into its city limits almost at will. If the City of Austin wanted to, it could annex Wells Branch and we would lose our local control. The city has to give a 3 year notice, but the area being annexed has little to no say in the process. Municipal Annexation Reform has been a big topic at the State Capitol as cities are being criticized for abusing their annexation power. Typically a city will annex an area motivated by tax revenue but not maintain the area to the same standard as before and the residents suffer.

During this legislature session, Senator Donna Campbell and Representative Dan Huberty submitted bills that would allow the residents who are being annexed to vote before the city could annex them. This would give the citizens power in choosing if they wanted to be annexed by the city or not. If the voters rejected the city's annexation proposal, the city would have to wait a year before another vote could occur.

The bill passed the Senate and the House; but each had different amendments added to it. To get to the final version, a special committee of both Senators and Representatives was formed. The House voted and passed this final version as the very last bill of the session. However in the Senate, Jose Menendez from San Antonio conducted a 2 hour filibuster that killed the bill. Kirk Watson, our state senator, participated in the filibuster.

There is a ray of hope for this year. Governor Greg Abbott has called for a Special Session. One of the items listed is Municipal Annexation Reform. While we do not know for certain if the Senate and House will actually make meaningful reforms; there is a very good chance they will. Other good news is that our state representative Celia Israel has been extremely supportive of the Annexation Reforms. She voted for it throughout the process. I encourage everyone to stay engaged as this issue directly impacts Wells Branch. We need to continue pushing for a right to vote on where we live and for what is in the best interest of our community.

Summer Safety Reminders

Summer is a great time in Wells Branch - keep yourself and your property safe this summer by following the suggestions in this article.

Most of the crimes around Wells Branch are crimes of opportunity and unfortunately, those types of crime tend to increase as the weather gets warmer. Make that extra effort to not become a victim.

- Take your keys.
- · Lock your car.
- Don't leave anything of value in plain sight. Better yet, take it in the house.
- Keep your garage doors closed; do not leave an open garage unattended.
- Always lock the inside garage door.
- If you park your car in the driveway or on the street, make sure you take the remote garage door opener in with you.
 A garage door opener gives instant protected access to your home and your belongings.
- · Check your mail every single day.
- Be aware of your surroundings at all times.
- Keep your house secure when working in the yard.
- When leaving your home, pay close attention to anything that doesn't look right.
- Never put yourself at risk.

Call 9-1-1 **IMMEDIATELY** if you see **ANYTHING** suspicious. Many of the break-ins we've suffered could have been prevented. The Sheriff's Office can't be everywhere all the time. They rely on neighbors to be their eyes and ears in their absence and to alert them to dangerous situations. Don't stop to ask a friend, the Google Group, Facebook or the folks on Nextdoor. **Call 9-1-1 FIRST**, then share with your neighbors. Time is of the essence. If you're not sure if it's an emergency - DON'T WORRY - the dispatcher will prioritize the call. Never be afraid to call! Travis County would much rather answer a false alarm than deal with a tragedy later. If it doesn't feel right, it probably isn't - **CALL!**

A NOTE ABOUT 3-1-1: In short, DON'T USE IT - In a recent copy of The WORD, the WB MUD recommended using 3-1-1 to report crimes. Unfortunately, 3-1-1 is a City of Austin service and we're in the county. While you would eventually be routed to the correct entity, it's always best (and quickest) to call 9-1-1 and tell them you're in Travis County. If you need to report a crime that's already taken place (not in progress), you may call the non-emergency number at 512-974-0845 and press 3 to be connected, file a report online at tcsheriff. org/community/file-a-report, or call 9-1-1 and they'll route your call appropriately. 3-1-1 may be used to report street light outages for Austin Energy lights (not Oncor) and Animal Control if it's a non-emergency. If you're in need of immediate assistance, always call 9-1-1. In addition, 3-1-1 does not work with some cell carriers when dialed from outside the city limits. To report graffiti for removal, contact the WB MUD via http://www.wellsbranchmud.com/services/graffitireport-removal.

Jogger & Cyclist Safety: Visibility is Key

Hello everyone! I live in WB and would like to share some observations from my pre-daylight commute to work. There are a significant number of pedestrians and cyclists out and about before the sun comes up. Unfortunately, there are some who are not being as safety conscious as they should be. As I travel northbound on Wells Port to Grand Avenue, I daily pass runners and cyclists who are nearly invisible to drivers. Both the joggers and the cyclists sometimes veer into the designated traffic lanes to avoid parked vehicles. Joggers are running three and four abreast, which puts them outside the designated biking/pedestrian lanes and into the path of oncoming traffic. A majority of those who are out before daylight take proper measures to make themselves visible and I want to thank you. Because you are readily visible I can adjust my speed to well below the posted limit and keep a safe distance between you and my vehicle. If you have to veer into my lane, at least I can see you from a distance and adjust to accommodate you, or even stop until you are safely around my vehicle.

Wells Port is a winding street with blind curves, cars are entering from the side streets and drivers are often focused on other vehicles, not necessarily pedestrians or cyclists. I would feel horrible if I hit someone. An accident of this nature could be life changing for all those involved, particularly the unprotected jogger or cyclist. Even if someone is driving the posted speed limit and you are struck, your injuries could be disabling or lethal. Pavement is not forgiving to the human body!

So, to my neighbors who are out exercising before dawn, keep it up, just please do it safely. Make yourself as visible as possible and please try to stay in the designated pedestrian lanes. We can all share the roadways, even in the early morning hours, safely. To all drivers who may be out and about, please drive safely, respect the speed limits and please, please watch for pedestrians and cyclists. Our neighborhood has some wonderful amenities to enjoy nature and stay active. Let's all do our part to keep each other safe and healthy. Thank you!

How to Begin Birding? by Wanda Holcombe

According to Nicholas Lund in his article on **How to Begin Birding** at Audubon.org:

"I'm biased, but in my opinion, birding is the Greatest Pursuit Available It's basically a lifelong scavenger hunt played across the entire earth. It's equal parts science and poetry, hoots of triumph and quiet reflection, adventures to far-flung corners of the world and discoveries in your own back yard..."

WHERE TO BEGIN:

- *In your own back yard or apartment window/or balcony
- *In the beautiful park around you in Wells Branch
- *At the Nature Viewing Station near Mills Pond
- **1. Get Excited and Read Up:** Start by visiting the WBNA website for a list of the *Top 20 Birds of Wells Branch* found under the Community Tab for Birding in WB. You can also visit the WB Community Library to check out field guides and other books on Birds in Central Texas, or purchase a simple fold out of Birds of Central Texas OR download a Birding App.
- **2. Gear Up:** You need very little equipment to get started, just something to hold to the eye to make those far-away birds a bit bigger. In the beginning, you don't need to worry about what kind of binoculars you're using. Use whatever you have or can borrow and start watching. Binoculars and some form of field guide are plenty to get started.
- **3. Get Out There:** The time has come to actually get outside. There are a lots of resources you can use to determine what birds have been seen nearby, like the "explore data" section of eBird or postings on the WBNA website.

And that's it, you're a birder! Attend one of the hosted Bird Walks in Wells Branch or free bird walks with Travis Audubon Society which are listed on their website: travisaudubon.org

Hosted Bird Walks by Sharon Richardson will continue on the 2nd Monday of each month during the Summer at 8:00 am at the Mills Pond Gazebo: July 10 & August 14. There will be NO Hosted Bird Walks on Saturday this summer, but they will resume in September.


Mr. PC's Computer Corner by Dave DeVore

Ransomware. What is it? I learned firsthand about 6 years ago when I turned on my main business computer only to see a screen divided into quadrants. One had a live picture of me on my webcam, another contained a message saying that Homeland Security had determined that I had done something illegal and needed to pay a \$300 "fine" to regain access to my pc. The next part detailed how I could purchase a MoneyPak (untraceable money) and send it in within 72 hours to get a password or say goodbye to my machine. The last section featured an ominous clock counting down from 72 hours. I knew of such attacks and dove for the wall, pulling the plug. This is not the recommended way to shut down, but I am a trained professional! I restored the computer to its previous state, since the early forms of ransomware merely locked you out of your computer.

Fast forward to today, when these attackers rapidly encrypt (scramble) your files BEFORE they demand the ransom and 99% of the time you can't get your precious documents, pictures of the grandbabies, etc. back unless you pay up. The price has gone up to \$500-\$1000 or more. Besides individuals, businesses are targets. The May attacks against Fedex, the UK's National Health System and 200,000 other businesses and governmental units in 150 countries by WannaCry ransomware highlighted the need for education and more robust protection products. The bad guys don't need to be brilliant hackers anymore. In fact, there are "ransomware kits" for sale on the dark web now that any kid can use.

How can the average person protect themselves? Purchase a good online backup plan from Carbonite, IDrive or a similar solution that maintains a rolling 30 previous days of your files so your data is kept off site and secure. Make sure you have an up to date antivirus package and run it automatically daily. I use the built-in Windows Defender program. Run Windows updates and application updates, since most fixes are security patches. Don't click on pop-ups or email attachments, two of the more common ways these viruses are spread. Don't pay the ransom, unless there are critical files involved. I hope these pointers help keep my WB neighbors from the heartache of ransomware!
