Fire Safety News! National Fire Prevention Week - October 5-11

Help us sound the alarm that working smoke alarms save lives.

Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in

Did you know that many people don't test their smoke alarms as often as they should? When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. You need

working smoke alarms to give you time to get out. Test yours every month!

Almost two-thirds (62%) of reported home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement. Interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.

An ionization smoke alarm is generally more responsive to flaming fires, and a photoelectric smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires. For the best protection, both types of alarms or a combination alarm (photoelectric and ionization) should be installed in homes.

Smoke rises; install smoke alarms following manufacturer's instructions high on a wall or on a ceiling. Save manufacturer's instructions for testing and maintenance.

Test alarms at least monthly by pushing the test button.

Replace batteries in all smoke alarms at least once a year. If an alarm "chirps", warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away. Daylight Savings Time provides a convenient reminder to change the batteries when you set your clocks

Replace all smoke alarms, including alarms that use 10-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond properly.

What is Neighborhood Watch?



Neighborhood Watch is a non-confrontational crime prevention program that enlists the active participation of neighborhood residents in cooperation with law enforcement to reduce crime in their com-

It is neighbors getting to know each other and taking the time to care about each other. It is a program of mutual assistance and security.

It is neighbors trained to recognize and report suspicious activities in their neighborhood and report that activity to local law enforcement.

The Neighborhood Watch program employs the best crime fighting tool ever invented - a watchful neighbor.

Duties of Neighborhood Watch Volunteers

Duties of Block Leader:

- · Meet all residents on your block
- Explain the purpose of the Neighborhood Watch Program
- Enlist block residents to participate in the program to be aware of happenings on their block
- Explain procedures for reporting any suspicious person or activity to law enforcement
- · Assist neighbors in identification of security needs
- Be aware of special needs of neighbors
- Be aware of and report neighborhood maintenance needs (i.e. street light outages)
- Organize block activities to support Neighborhood Watch and neighborhood interaction

Duties of a Neighborhood Watch participant:

- Get to know your neighbors.
- Exchange telephone numbers and emergency contact information.
- Be alert to activity on your street. Know when something is suspicious.
- · Learn when and how to contact Travis County Sheriff's Office to make a report.

Remember that Neighborhood Watch participants serve as eyes and ears only. They DO NOT attempt to apprehend. That is the responsibility of law enforcement.

Affordable Housing Update

Art at Bratton's Edge received an award for 9% Housing Tax Credits after competing in the 2014 application cycle through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs on Thursday July 31, 2014. The 5.05 acre site proposed for Art at Bratton's Edge is located on the southeast corner of Long Vista Drive and Bratton Lane.

Art at Bratton's Edge will consist of 76 units of which, 68 are targeted as affordable at 30-60% AMI and 8 units for market rate housing. The current development plan includes two and three-story buildings and a two story clubhouse/amenities center with units above. The property will have a mix of one, two and three bedroom units.

Art at Bratton's Edge is set to close on the property by the end of the year now that a commitment of funds has been awarded. The project will break ground in the second quarter of 2015, will begin leasing activities the following fall and will be open by second quarter of 2016.

Update on New RRISD Elementary at Sauls/ Bratton by Debby Thompson, WBNA President

The preliminary site plan is ready! RRISD plans to break ground in March or April of 2015 with a target completion date of May 2016, opening for classes that August. Attendance boundaries won't be addressed until 2015 at the earliest. The two-story building includes 48 classrooms and should accommodate 960 students without the addition of portables. They have planned for portables if needed at a later date and the site will be prewired for such.

The engineers did stress that all drawings are preliminary and subject to change. These are "FIRST DRAFTS ONLY" and may not necessarily reflect the finished product accurately. Slides will be posted on the WBNA website with updates in the near future. Look for the page under "Community".

Regarding safety and traffic flow, the architects have included a long staging area down Sauls Drive with parking along the left-hand side of the drive. The "front" drive (as they refer to it) on Sauls has room for 53 cars to queue up for pick-up or drop-off with room for 14 more vehicles between the entrance to the drive and the Bratton Lane intersection. Bus access is planned for the Crissom entrance.

The section of Grand Avenue Pkwy yet to be built has been permitted by a developer who plans to build a subdivision north of the school campus. While there's no guarantee on timing, there is a possibility that the road extension will be in place by the time the school opens. Although this addition

will increase traffic through existing residential areas, it will also provide an alternative entrance/exit for those in Willow Run.

Crosswalks and Common Sense

Recently the Wells Branch neighborhood has been blessed with additional crosswalks. In addition, MUD safety chair Tom Cheshire has requested a crosswalk for Bratton Lane/Brad to connect the pond and trails to the dog park.

Crosswalks and the safety issues surrounding them can be confusing for both pedestrians and drivers. Marked crosswalks may give a false sense of security to those on foot and on bikes. Courtesy and caution should always be exercised due to the disproportionate size of vehicles to people/people on bikes. While this may seem common-sense to many, just because a pedestrian or bicyclist is *able* to cross the street inside of a marked crosswalk doesn't mean the law says that same pedestrian/cyclist legally has the right-of-way. The driver of that much larger vehicle can easily hit the person/cyclist in or out of a marked crosswalk which is why it is so important that ALL parties pay attention!

We should teach our children not to ride their bikes across the road in crosswalks and to look carefully. We fully expect drivers to be alert, NOT be using their cell phones and to adjust their speed when coming down a hill, approaching an intersection (unmarked crossing areas) or the well marked crosswalks in the neighborhood. A pedestrian should never have to jump out of the way to avoid being hit. Remember drivers, it is hard for a pedestrian to judge your speed!

So what is the LAW? (paraphrased from much longer article) Vehicles are supposed to yield right of way to pedestrians at a marked crosswalk:

- If there is no traffic signal and the pedestrian is in the half of the roadway (or very closely approaching) where the vehicle is traveling then the vehicle is supposed to yield. NOTE: This does not give pedestrians the right to barge into the crosswalk without adequate distance for the vehicle to stop.
- Vehicles cannot pass a vehicle stopped to yield to a pedestrian in the crosswalk.
- Drivers are supposed to use proper precaution to avoid colliding with a pedestrian in a crosswalk and warn the pedestrian with a horn blast if needed.
- Pedestrians must yield the right of way to vehicles when there is no marked crosswalk and should use extreme care in crossing.

This is just a reminder that we all need to be more careful as we encourage the use of bike lanes and trails that place smaller, more vulnerable people in the roadways with vehicles. Becoming a hood ornament is not on my bucket list.

Finally, a crosswalk to cross the ever busy Wells Port! We

have had too many close calls trying to cross the street here. Thanks to our MUD Safety Chair, Tom Cheshire, for requesting this much needed crosswalk and for Travis County installing it!

WB Disc Golf Supports Local Charities

Disc golf can benefit both player and community in several ways. For players, it takes a good attitude and character to maintain composure when things are not going as intended. Played without a referee, disc golf presents many opportunities for players to practice honesty, patience, perseverance, and humility. There are also the benefits of being physically active outdoors and developing mental skills such as confidence, concentration, problem solving, and decision-making. Disc golf at Wells Branch also benefits the community by supporting local charities. On February 1, 2014, a benefit for the Capital Area Food Bank raised \$1,375 in monetary donations and 437 pounds of food. On July 13, the WB Disc Golf Club (WBDGC) hosted an event for Team Red, White, and Blue, a veterans group whose mission is to create a network between communities and veterans who are reintegrating into civilian life by using physical fitness and social events. On September 1, the WBDGC hosted a charity round of disc golf to raise \$250 to support the Ronald McDonald House. In addition to the charity events, the WB Disc Golf Club gives back to the greenbelt by planting and mulching trees at the disc golf course twice a year. Sixty percent of club member dues are allocated towards tree planting, with five new trees each March and five more in September. The next course work day is scheduled for September 27. These work days improve both the character of the course and the mindset of the volunteers to feel protective of the greenbelt and to look for ways to keep the park looking its best.

Disc golf is a friendly social game regardless of playing for fun, charity, or competition. I hope you'll come by the WB course to give it a try. Bring a buddy or your family. You'll meet some nice people and perhaps find a new favorite sport. To visit the course, park along Owen Tech Blvd. behind Whataburger. If you're interested in joining the WB Disc Golf Club, you can find the club membership coordinator, Mike Shay, at the course each evening at 5 p.m. and on weekends at 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

American Heritage Girls Troop 0240, Betsy & Steve Harper, Lisa & Kevin Ward and Capital Area Master Naturalist Shelley Palmer teamed up to create a butterfly garden on the far east end of the creek. Monarchs, Milkweed, & Wells Branch

The plight of the Monarchs, milkweed, and how

we all can help by Betsey Harper and Shelley Palmer

Various environmental and scientific groups have requested that the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service protect the Monarch butterfly and list it as a threatened species, pointing to a dramatic population decline over the last 20 years. These groups list milkweed habitat loss as a major reason for the decline in Monarch populations. Monarchs rely heavily on the milkweed as a host plant. Females lay eggs on the leaves of the plant, and the young caterpillars feed on it. The diet makes the caterpillars and the adults toxic and bitter tasting to predators such as birds.

How YOU can help - Milkweed is incredibly hard to grow from seed. We've had much better results with native milkweed "plugs" available through Monarch Watch http://www. monarchwatch.org/. Order now so they arrive as early in spring as possible. Order Green Milkweed (*Asclepias viridis*), the most common milkweed in Texas or Antelope Horns (*Asclepias asperula*) which gets its name from the seed pods that look similar to the horns of an antelope.If EACH of US

plant some native milkweed in our gardens, we can help to ensure that the beautiful Monarchs continue their long trip through Texas every year.

Several folks in the neighborhood got a chance to experience the summer Purple Martin spectacle at Highland Mall, viewing nearly a half a million birds swirling in to roost in 3 trees in mere minutes. Another "cool" summer bird event is the Chimney Swift count. The first weekend count was held on the weekend of August 8-10 and the second, the weekend of September 12-14 where teams of Swift counters gather at various roost sites (old brick chimneys) in the Austin area, counting from a dozen to several hundred Chimney Swifts dropping in for the night.
