#### Give the Gift of Holiday Fire Safety

As you prepare to celebrate the upcoming holidays, Travis County Emergency Services District #2 (the Pflugerville Fire Department) encourages everyone in Wells Branch to put safety at the top of the gift list! Thanksgiving is the #1 day of the year for home cooking fires, followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve. Here's what you can do to help keep your home a place of joy this holiday season:

<u>Use a Timer</u>—It's easy to forget you have the stove or oven on, especially once you sit down to enjoy your feast. Always use a timer to remind you to turn things off.

<u>Stay with the Stove</u>—Never leave your house unattended when you have food cooking in the oven – not even a ham or turkey! And always stay in the kitchen whenever you are cooking on the stovetop. Keep the handles of your pots and pans turned back away from the edge of the stove so they aren't knocked or pulled down. Even when the stove is off but <u>especially</u> when it's on, keep the area around the stove clear of flammable items such as hot pads, paper towels, cookbooks, decorations, and notes/cards.

<u>Keep Kids Back</u>—Always keep children at least 3 feet away from a hot stovetop. Move regular and electric knives well out of their reach. Don't let them too close to hot dishes or liquids such as gravy and coffee.

<u>Caution with Cords</u>—Be sure cords from electric knives, coffee makers, plate warmers, and mixers are not dangling off of the counter. Adults may accidentally snag these dangerous items, and children may be tempted to pull them down.

Avoid Turkey Fryers—The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) warns that turkey fryers using cooking oil are not safe even for well-informed and careful home cooks. Turkey fryers use a lot of cooking oil at high temperatures, and there's a significant danger that hot oil will be released during cooking. Additionally, the burners that heat the oil can ignite spilled oil.

<u>Light it Right</u>—Some holiday lights are only safe for indoor or outdoor use, but NOT both. When hanging holiday lights, use clips – not nails – to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged. If you need to use a ladder, work with a partner on the ground. Replace any string of lights that has worn or broken cords or any loose bulb connections. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for the maximum number of light strands to connect.

<u>Take Care with Candles</u>—Keep lit candles away from centerpieces, decorations, curtains, and other things that can burn. Locate them away from windows and doors so your emergency exits are not blocked if objects catch fire. Always blow out candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Try using battery-operated candles instead!



#### Branch BBQ & Catering Celebrates 25 Years in Wells Branch by Gus Kohn

After managing a Texas Tumbleweed Steak House and later working as a salesman for Sysco Foods, Chris Carby wanted to be his own boss. On December 1, 1994, Chris and Catherine bought and began running Branch BBQ which for two years had been operating in Wells Branch but not having great success. With hard work and persistent dedication, they resurrected the business. Offering good food at reasonable prices, the Carbys began what has become a successful restaurant and catering business. With 12 employees now and 25 years behind them, I asked Chris what made Branch BBQ such a sensation.

They got their first catering job in their first week of business; cooking for 700 people each day for two days for the Grand Opening of Ropers nightclub. Imagine, catering 1400 meals the first week in the restaurant business! Chris says the kitchen was inadequately equipped to store the prepared food for the big event and he called everyone he knew with refrigerator space to handle it, but handle it he did and thus began the catering champion that Branch BBQ & Catering is today.

As tribute to Dot of <u>Dot's Place</u> ("his other mother"), Chris offers his Friday specials; Chicken & Dumplings, Turnip Greens and Candied Yams with rolls. Chris' many specialty recipes have evolved over time to become what they are today. Recipes like Collard Greens, Green Bean Casserole, Chris' Meatloaf (Thursdays only), Smoked Catfish & Peach Cobbler have become local favorites. Get there by 1pm on Fridays or don't

expect there to be any Green Bean Casserole left; he makes a limited amount. Be sure and stop by and try out their new menu item, Pork Belly. Tender and moist, it's a great addition to an already superb menu.

The secret to Branch BBQ & Catering's success is hard work, quality offerings, doing the right thing by people and very importantly, being a member of the community. They are present at every FourthFest, they cook the turkey, ham, potatoes, stuffing, gravy, and rolls we all enjoy at the MUD hosted Thanksgiving Potluck dinner, they support a number of community service groups like Northwest Elementary, WB Disc

Golf Club, Friends of the Library and WBNA among others. Chris is the voice of Connally Cougar Football, and you will see him behind an apron doing what he loves best at National Night Out.

Long time WB resident, Mary Hale, put it this way, "If you've ever wondered what a *TRUE* neighborhood restaurant looks like, this is it! Chris *IS* community." If you haven't sampled Branch BBQ, stop in and see what all the buzz is about, you will not regret it, and wave at Chris in the back as he follows his heart.

This includes Electronics & Styrofoam Recycling. Our next Extreme Clean is scheduled for January 11 from 8am-2pm.

**Drug Take Back & Shredding** are twice a year, occurring the second Saturday of April and October from 8am-2pm. Our April 11, 2020 Extreme Clean has been rescheduled for the first Saturday, April 4 this coming year so as not to conflict with the Easter Egg Hunt.

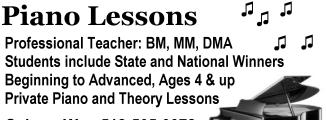

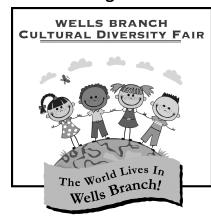

#### **Carbon Monoxide Safety**

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a gas. It has no odor. CO gas is poisonous. It can make a person feel sick and can be deadly. In the home, heating and cooking devices that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

#### CO ALARMS

- CO alarms should be installed outside each sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. It is best to use interconnected alarms. When one sounds, all CO alarms in the home sound.
- Follow the instruction on the package to properly install the CO alarm.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month.
- Replace CO alarms according to the instructions on the package.
- Know the sounds the CO alarm makes. It will sound if CO is detected. It will make a different sound if the battery is low or if it is time to get a new CO alarm.
- If the battery is low, replace it.
- If the CO alarm sounds, you must get fresh air. Move outdoors, by an open window or near an open door.
   Make sure everyone in the home gets to fresh air. Call the fire department from a fresh air location. Stay there until help arrives.

#### PREVENT CO POISONING

- When warming a vehicle, move it out of the garage. Do not run a fueled engine indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not blocked. Clear snow away.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- Clear all debris from dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace vents
- A generator should be used outdoors. Use in a wellventilated location away from windows, doors, and vent opening.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO. Only use them outside.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in.
- Open the damper when using a fireplace for adequate ventilation.
- Never use your oven or stove to heat your home.

#### FACT!

CO is called the invisible killer because the gas cannot be seen or smelled. Take action to stay safe from CO poisoning.

#### **Helping Your Child Stay Focused as** Winter Break Approaches by Betsey Harper

As the fall colors around our neighborhood start to disappear and the winter holiday decorations start to appear, school children lose their education focus and start to

daydream. How can we blame them? I know I have a hard time too. Here are some ways to help your child stay focused until winter break: **Get the wiggles out first.** Moving the body motivates the brain. Make sure your child has had a chance to run, walk, or jump around before sitting down to homework.

Turn off screens and electronics. Before your kid tackles homework or does anything that takes concentration, turn off the television, and remove the cell phones and electronics.

Make a to-do list. Having a lot of chores and homework assignments can be overwhelming for kids. Help your child focus on getting things done by making a list — together— of everything she/he needs to do for the day or week. Then let her/him cross off each task as they finishes it forsmall successes.

#### **Holiday Safety Tips**

With the bustle of the holidays just around the corner, make sure you're taking every precaution possible to keep your home and family safe and secure. We usually see an increase in opportunistic crime this time of year; please remain vigilant.

Keep your blinds and drapes closed when away, even if only for a short period of time.

Keep your house well lit at night (backyard included). A motion sensor activated light is an inexpensive deterrent.

If your Christmas tree is displayed in front of a window, don't pile the presents around it. Store the gifts in another area away from view when the blinds or drapes are open.

Do NOT put the empty boxes for the new computer, TV, stereo system, etc. on the curb for the trash. Take the time to break down every box and put it inside your trashcan/recycling bin so that it is concealed, even if you have to hold it over to the next week. People start cruising our neighborhood on Sunday afternoons to see what has been put out. The less they know about what you have inside, the better.

Door-to-door solicitations increase tremendously this time of year. Always look out the window or peephole before opening the door or answering a knock. Never open the door all the way, especially if you have a Christmas tree and/or presents in plain view.

Always lock your car. Never leave your car running unattended or leave your keys in the car or ignition. If you usually keep a garage door remote control in your car and don't park it in the garage each and every time you return home, hide the remote or take it inside. Thieves check visors and this gives them instant protected access to your home.

Keep your garage door closed at all times and keep the inside door from your home to the garage **LOCKED**.

Don't leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Take them in the house or put them in the trunk out of sight **BEFORE** arriving at your destination.

While shopping this holiday season, remain aware of your surroundings at all times. If unsure of your safety, ask a store attendant to have security walk you to your car. You can't be too safe. This goes for trips to the grocery store as well. When unloading your car at home after a day of shopping, lock it between trips to and from the car.

#### If you plan to be away:

Let a neighbor and/or block captain know you'll be out of town and when you'll return. They should have the following: your emergency contact information; contact information for anyone with access to your house (pet sitter, etc.); when they should be expected; what they look like and a description of their vehicle(s).

**Let only those who NEED to know**, know when you are going out of town.

#### Don't share vacation plans on social media.

Arrange to have your lawn cared for if you are going to be away.

Don't hide keys under doormats or flowerpots or in similar places.

Put your lights, stereo or TV on timers.

Keep your house well lit at night (backyard included)
Leave a car in the driveway or ask a neighbor to park in it.
Don't cancel your paper or mail deliveries; ask that your neighbor pick them up every day.

Leave a key with a friend or neighbor; ask that the house be checked at regular intervals.

#### Store all your valuables.

Consider asking friends or relatives to live in your home while you are away.

Ask your neighbor to put trash in your trashcan and to put it out for collection and away when they put theirs away.

File a Close Patrol Request. The filing of this form alerts patrolling officers so that they may pay close attention to one's residence. To do so: Contact the Travis County Sheriff's Office at 512-854-9721. Ask to make a Close Patrol Request. You will be asked for information on those caring for your home while you're away - make and model of their vehicles, name, description and times they should be at your home.

A comprehensive list of Safety Tips as well as numerous articles by the Travis County Sheriff Deputies are posted on our website, http://wbna.us under the Safety tab. There's also a wealth of information available at tcsheriff.org.

If you are not already, become a Wells Branch Neighborhood Association member. "Like" us on Facebook for community updates. The more community involvement and connectedness there is, the safer we all will be.

Join the community listserv aka 'The Google Group' by sending your name, physical address and email to wbneighbors@gmail.com.

Most of all, be aware of your surroundings and look out for your neighbors. If you see or hear something suspicious, call 911. The Sheriff's Department would much rather answer a false alarm than deal with a tragedy later.

We live in a **GREAT** community **AND** a **SECURE** neighborhood. Let's all do our part to keep it that way. **Here's to a safe and happy holiday season!**

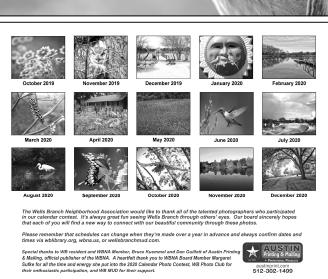

#### Mr. PC's Computer Corner by Dave DeVore

When I first got into the technology consulting business in 1997, networks were only found in businesses and it required a network engineer to set them up and to keep them running daily. Fast forward 22 years and EVERYONE has a network in their home, most with wifi for streaming media and for using multiple devices simultaneously such as tablets, laptops and smartphones. Most home networks were setup by the end users, most often with the default factory settings, making them easy targets for hackers or neighbors wanting to steal your bandwidth. I see this every day and the bad guys are aware of it also. Over the years, wifi networks have become more powerful, with more range, making them sitting ducks for intrusions from outside the home. If your network seems suddenly slow, it may be because a vampire neighbor is on it, doing who knows what that you may end up being responsible for. Here are some simple steps to lock things down and make it much more difficult for a break in to occur.

First, check your router login name and password. If they're still set to the factory defaults, change them using stronger standards. Use at least 10 characters for the password with a combination of upper- and lower-case letters, numbers and maybe a symbol like the @ sign. Second, make sure the router security is set to a flavor of WPA2 or WPA3, which are much stronger than the old WEP that is easily hacked. Third, see if your SSID, (your network name) such as JonesHomeNetwork, is being broadcast. There should be a checkbox by both your normal and your guest network SSID to enable or disable broadcasting them. Turn these off. This won't block determined hackers, but it will stop a large percentage of attempts to use your wifi since it is now invisible. Finally, while you are in your router's settings, look at which devices are connected to it. If you see Joe's iPad or Don's laptop and don't recognize these people, the changes to your passwords, security level and not broadcasting the SSIDs should block them out after your next router restart. Save the settings changes you have made, restart your router and when it comes up you will hopefully be much more secure. I hope this has been helpful.
