
4thFest Festivities

Fireworks Safety Pflugerville Fire / Travis Co ESD No.2 Every year around July 4th and New Year's Eve, we often receive the question, "Are fireworks legal around here?" The answer depends on where you are located! Within the City of Pflugerville boundaries, all fireworks (including sparklers) are ILLEGAL year round to possess or use. Local police enforce this law; you can report concerns any time of day to their non-emergency number at (512) 990-6700. In unincorporated Travis County outside of city limits, fireworks generally are legal but THERE ARE SEVERAL LIMITA-

works generally are legal but THERE ARE SEVERAL LIMITA-TIONS, some of which are listed below. Call the the Sheriff's dispatch number (512) 974-0845 then press OPTION 3 for fireworks issues in unincorporated Travis County.

- Fireworks cannot be used on public roadways.
- Fireworks cannot be used on school district property.
- Fireworks cannot be used within 600 feet of any church, a licensed child-care center, a hospital, or a public or private school or higher-education facility unless the person received written permission from that organization.
- Fireworks are illegal in Travis County parks.
- Fireworks are illegal to use on Wells Branch Municipal Utility District (MUD) property, which includes all MUD facilities, parks, trails, greenbelts, the Pond, drainage detention areas, the veloway, and the grassy area located at Robert I. Walker and Charla Circle.
- For all other properties, you must get written permission from the property owner to light any personal fireworks – even if it's a commercial property not in use at nighttime.

Even where fireworks are legal, they are risky to use and cause many fires and injuries around the U.S.! The safest legal way to enjoy fireworks is to attend a professional fireworks show, such as the Pfirecracker Pfestival in Pflugerville or the 4th Fest in Wells Branch. Here are a few other fireworks safety tips:

Make Fireworks a Family Activity

- Before the holiday, make a point to discuss fireworks safety with everyone in your family to decrease the chance of someone getting hurt.
- Never let children purchase fireworks without parents there even older kids.
- Insist on adult supervision whenever fireworks are being lit – even for older kids. Children age 10 to 14 years old actually get the second-most number of fireworks burns and injuries, right behind preschoolers and toddlers!

Kids who are younger than kindergarten-age should never be allowed to hold any fireworks on their own, including sparklers. Sparklers reach temperatures hot enough to melt metal. Give little kids glow-sticks instead! Pass the sparklers to much older kids and adults to carefully light ONE at a time – ideally wearing gloves. Respect Vets, Pets, and Neighbors

- Keep in mind that the sound of fireworks can be very stressful for some veterans and others who experience Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). It also scares many dogs and other pets.
- When a holiday falls on a weeknight, remember that most people will be getting up early the next day and go to work. Please respect your neighbors' work schedule.
- Fireworks are poisonous to pets. Be sure not to leave behind any used fireworks where pets (yours or someone else's) spend time.

You must get written permission from the property owner to light any personal fireworks there – even if the property is currently vacant.

Preparing to Light Fireworks

- Only light fireworks <u>OUTSIDE</u> on a flat surface that's far from any homes or buildings. Don't light fireworks near dry grass or leaves you can catch them on fire.
- Before you light a firework, take a good look around to be sure there aren't any people or pets in range of possibly getting hurt.

Don't lean over firework devices or place your hand over them when lighting. Immediately back up as far as you can after lighting! The body parts that suffer the most fireworks injuries are fingers, hands, eyes, face, and ears.

Safely Disposing of Fireworks

 Don't try to re-light fireworks that didn't work on the first try!

Thoroughly soak all fireworks, even the ones that did not work, in a bucket of water or with a hose before putting in the trash.

Heat Stroke: Know the Signs Pflugerville Fire / Travis Co ESD No.2

During hot and humid weather, your body has a harder time cooling. When the body heats up too quickly to properly cool itself – or when too much fluid/salt is lost through sweating or dehydration – the victim may suffer heat exhaustion or heat stroke which is very serious. Below are tips on preventing heat stroke, recognizing its symptoms, and first aid. And remember: never leave kids, pets, or disabled adults alone in parked cars ... not even for a few minutes! Have a safe and enjoyable summer everybody.

PREVENTING HEAT STROKE


- Slow down! Reduce, cancel or reschedule strenuous activities until the coolest time of the day
- Even if you don't feel thirsty, proactively bring and drink plenty of water (not very cold) or other non-alcoholic, decaffeinated fluids
- Prevent sunburn through sunscreen, sunhats, and minimizing direct exposure to the sun; a sunburn reduces your body's ability to cool down
- Dress in lightweight, loose-fitting, light-colored clothing to reflect heat and sunlight
- Eat light, cool, easy-to-digest foods such as fruit or salad
- Take a cool bath or shower
- Spend time in air-conditioned locations
- When the room temperature is hotter than 90°, don't direct the flow of portable electric fans toward you because the dry, blowing air may further dehydrate you

HEAT STROKE SYMPTOMS

- Altered mental state or confusion
- Hot, red, dry, or moist skin
- One or more of these symptoms: dizziness, throbbing headache, nausea, shallow breathing
- Rapid and strong pulse
- Fainting or loss of consciousness
- Body temperature 103°F or greater

FIRST AID FOR HEAT STROKE

- Heat stroke is a severe medical emergency! Call 9-1-1 or get the victim to a hospital immediately
- Get to a cooler setting, preferably air-conditioned
- Do not give fluids
- Reduce body temperature with cool cloths or a bath
- Use a fan only IF the heat index is BELOW the high-90s

Safety on the Trails: Better Safe Than Sorry by Margaret Sufke

Recent events raised by several concerned community members prompted this safety refresher article. After speaking with TCSO Deputy Robert Phillips, he confirmed once again, when in doubt better to "shout out" and call 911.

Our parks system is what makes Wells Branch one of the best communities in North Austin. The WB MUD Parks and Recreation department, working with TexaScapes, does an amazing job of keeping the parks and trail system in great shape.

Having such a wonderful public space, means of course that folks use the parks and trails. Normally, these areas are a safe place to relax, bike, dog walk, fish and exercise. That said, folks should always be aware of their surroundings. Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind in the public areas of Wells Branch.

- Do not hesitate to call 911 safety first, officers would rather respond to a possible concern and be proactive in preventing an issue
- If something or someone seems out of place or suspicious, get to a safe place and call 911 right away, try to note any identifiable features, clothes, cars, etc.
- Always carry a phone and a light during dawn, dusk and evening hours
- Let others know when you head out and when you plan
- Walk or ride with others whenever possible, or follow along where others are using the system

- Do not wander too far off trails, move into the wooded areas or walk into the underpasses if a stranger seems to linger or stare
- If you become uncomfortable or feel threatened, move towards a group, a building close by or return to your car, lock the doors and call 911
- If you drive away or are followed **do NOT drive home**. Drive to a well lit area, an open WB MUD facility building, the local fire station or a busy shopping center parking lot—and again call 911
- **NEVER** follow or directly challenge a stranger who is acting suspiciously, simply move to a safe area and call 911

Be aware that calling 311 for a "non-threatening" issue, actually confounds the reporting process, as all those calls are first directed to APD, which does not serve the Wells Branch EJT area, and your call is routed back into the main incident responders. Calling 911 is your best defense. Speaking with a trained incident responder will help to quell your concerns. If the issue is wildlife or animal related call 311 or 512-974-2000. 311 does not work on all carriers in the ETJ. Lately they have been extremely busy, but they will offer suggestions and advice and if the animal is in distress or is in true danger they will respond.

If there is a physical problem along the trail system or the pond area, please call the WB MUD office as soon as you can. Consider saving their number in your phone: 512-251-9814.



Vacation Safety Tips

- Let a neighbor and/or block captain know you'll be out of town and when you'll return. They should have the following: your emergency contact information; contact information for anyone with access to your house (pet sitter, etc.); when they should be expected; what they look like and a description of their vehicle(s).
- Let only those who NEED to know, know when you are going out of town.
- Don't share vacation plans OR photos on social media.
- Arrange to have your lawn cared for if you are going to be
- Don't hide keys under doormats, flowerpots or in similar places.
- Put your lights, stereo and/or TV on timers.
- Leave a car in the driveway or ask a neighbor to park in it.
- Don't cancel your paper or mail deliveries; ask that your neighbor pick them up every day.
- Leave a key with a friend or neighbor; ask that the house be checked at regular intervals.
- Keep your house well lit at night (backyard included) with a motion sensor or photocell activated light.
- Store all your valuables.
- Consider asking friends or relatives to live in your home while you are away.
- Ask your neighbor to put trash in your trashcan and to put it out for collection and away when they put theirs away.

Our May Garden Tour was a great success! Thanks to Amy Weaver for organizing it, Angie Moore for planning the route and creating the map and flyer, Joan Mead for publicity and all the gardeners who invited us into their beautiful gardens.

The tour featured eight gardens this year. We visited the St. Andrews garden and Tilelli's garden which included vegetables, herbs and flowers. Shonna and the Wells Branch Demonstration Garden had wildflowers and natives. Micki's yard had a variety of plants, shade structures and featured a fairy garden. Marlene's garden was rustic and had lots of interesting yard art. Laurie's yard featured stone raised beds and walkways with flowers and pollinators. Avni CH had beautiful flower gardens in containers and raised beds that surrounded her back yard. All of the gardens on the tour were unique and interesting, and the owners were so generous with their time to show their gardens and answer questions.

Our July 15 meeting will feature a presentation by Jill Douglass about Wells Branch becoming a Community Wildlife Habitat in partnership with the National Wildlife Federation. She will discuss the effects of lost habitats due to rapid development in the central Texas area and steps we can all take to support wildlife. Please see related article below.

Wells Branch Community Wildlife Habitat by Jill Douglass

The Wells Branch MUD has officially recognized the community wildlife habitat program as an integral part of its Urban Forest Management Plan. A community wildlife habitat includes not only private yards, but our local parks, businesses, schools, libraries, and places to worship. These entities can also certify as wildlife habitats.

If your property meets the requirements, certification is quite easy. You just fill out a form at https://nwf.org/CERTIFY and pay \$20. Your certification is valid for 10 years. Any property registered with the 78728 zip code automatically gets counted as part of the community wildlife habitat.

If you would like to know more about the certification requirements, Shelley Palmer and I will be presenting on the wildlife habitat program at the July 15 Garden Guild meeting at 10:00am in the Wells Branch Recreation Center.

Habitat Fact of the Day:

Tropical Milkweed (*Asclepias curassavica*) when planted outside its native habitat causes harm to monarch butter-flies because it hosts a protozoan parasite *Ophyrocystis elektroscirrha*. **Support our pollinators by planting NATIVE MILKWEEDS instead.** (e.g. *Asclepias viridis, Asclepias oenotheroides*). Invasion of the Dodder Weed by Shelley Palmer

The field by St. Andrew's church was *invaded* by a parasitic plant, Dodder Cuscuta, early this spring. This affected about half of the field from Wells Port east to the tree line and many of the affected hosts plants were dead or very close to it. The WB MUD contacted Texas A&M Agrilife and others in an attempt to understand the damage that this plant might cause and what our best steps might be to thwart it. We seem to be one of the very few that have reported this plants growth here in Central Texas - any others have been agriculture and the solution there is to change crops.

The MUD searched for the safest and most effective way to treat the plant, looking at low mowing to the use of fire to herbicides. The most effective, least harmful herbicide was chosen and that was applied in early May. It seems to have killed the dodder and the hosts and now there are already new plants popping up in the field.

Currently, the plan is to seed the field with native short grasses in the fall as grasses are not favored hosts of the dodder plant. The WB MUD will be watching for the plants that dodder favored and will likely remove them if they come up. The plant that seemed most favored in the field is a tall plant with bunches of small white flowers, this was researched and the best educated guess is that it is Prairie Bishop (Bifora Americana).

The WB MUD will be monitoring the field and an area on the trail between Klattenhoff and Gaylord that also had some dodder patches. If you see this wicked plant anywhere, please call the WB MUD office at 512-251-9814 to report it.

Of Damaged Trees Sprouting by Shelley Palmer

You might be noticing new sprouts on the limbs of trees that took some damage this winter. *" Sprouting is an attempt by the tree to replace the photosynthesis-generating foliage that was removed suddenly." It's important for the trees future to put some thought into how to deal with the sprouts and not just cut them all off.



Want to save money and help the planet?

The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) signed into law in 2022 directs nearly \$400 billion in

federal funding to clean energy and conservation efforts for homes and businesses. When fully implemented, it will reduce greenhouse gas pollution and get us close to meeting the Paris Agreement target needed to avoid the worst effects of climate change.

Savings come in the form of tax credits and rebates for battery storage, energy efficient electric appliances, solar panels, home weatherization, new and used electric vehicles and many other items. Not only do you save money up front, but improved energy efficiency will lower your utility bills and the cost of operating your car or truck.

Tax credits and rebates will be available for a ten year period, so you don't have to do everything at once. You can begin planning now and electrify your home and transportation over time.

Tax credits: Tax credits reduce the amount of your tax payment (or increase the refund). They are available now and there is no income limit (except for electric vehicle tax credits), but credits are capped at \$2000 per year. Electric vehicles, solar and battery storage are some, but not all, of the items that qualify.

Rebates: Rebates are awaiting the writing of state rules, but are anticipated to be available by the end of 2023 or early 2024. Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) rebates are tied to income levels with several tiers. Rebates up to \$1600 will be available for home weatherization such as air sealing, insulation, door and window upgrades - a great way to reduce the energy required to heat and cool your home. Many other items such as induction ovens, heat pump water heaters and clothes dryers will qualify.

Federal and state rebates and tax credits can be combined with rebates offered by your energy provider for even more savings.
