Neighborhood Watch Training Program Deputy Alexis White, TSCO Community Outreach Program Thursday, February 29 | 7:00-8:00pm WB Community Center | 2106 Klattenhoff Drive (immediately following the WBNA general meeting)

Last November the WBNA hosted the Travis County Sheriff's Office community forum for public safety. Prior to that session, the WBNA conducted a short neighborhood safety survey. One of the biggest takeaways was that folks wanted to reestablish an active, hands-on Neighborhood Watch group. 76% of the survey respondents indicated there was not an ACTIVE neighborhood watch group either on their street or within their immediate subdivision. Getting new block captains educated and re-assigning streets or manageable areas is the first step.

Deputy Alexis White will return to Wells Branch to lead a faceto-face Neighborhood Watch Block Training Class. It is important that those interested in becoming block captains attend this class in person. Personal connections and getting to know your neighbors are the fundamental cornerstones to this program. The best way to defeat local "crimes of convenience" is to be active in your area and get to know your neighbors.

The class is free and should last about an hour. After the class each block captain should plan on 1-2 hours a month following up with their neighbors, keeping in touch and sharing safety tips.

The WBNA is proud to host TCSO Deputy White. Both the WBNA and the WB MUD want to encourage safety and fellowship within the entire Wells Branch community. The WBNA team will work with the individual block captains to make sure they have the tools and knowledge required to help support their neighbors. As a friendly reminder, the WBNA is serving as the host for this class and has no direct authority for WB covenants or law enforcement.



Upcoming TCSO Citizens Academy

TCSO Community Outreach Unit is excited to host the 37th Citizens Academy this Spring. The academy provides citizens valuable insights on the criminal

justice process and the how's and why's of TCSO operations and services. We believe the education and dialogue the academy offers will further our efforts in improving community relations and the quality of life for Travis County residents.

The Citizens Academy is a 13-week program from March 21 - June 13, 2024. Citizens will meet every Thursday from 7:00 – 9:00 pm at the TCSO Central Command located at 5555 Airport Blvd., Austin, TX 78751.

Citizens receive classroom instruction by corrections officers, law enforcement deputies, civilians, and supervisors who work in each division within the department. The weekly sessions are not intended to train participants to be officers, but to help develop a citizenry with TCSO. 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To pee...or not to pee? by Dr. Liz Klekman, PT, DPT

It's been an hour since your morning coffee kicked in and your gigantic to-do list looms. You're looking at 2 hours of shuttling kids around along with all the basics of preparing for the week. Really, you don't have to pee before you leave. But you pee anyway. *Just in case.*

That's what we call it in the pelvic health world: just in case peeing. It's a habit that seems like a good idea at the time. What if you get the urge to go and you're in the check out line? What if you get stuck in traffic? What if you wet your pants in public? Plus, most of us have been trained to just in case pee since childhood. It's the sensible thing to do, right?

There are a few types of incontinence, but the two I see the most are urge incontinence and stress incontinence. Stress incontinence is the one we've all heard about where you leak when you cough, sneeze, jump, or laugh. Urge incontinence is a bit different. Urge is a brain issue. When you pee, just in case, you begin to train your brain to send the urge signal to your bladder inappropriately, before it's actually full. After a few years of this, you're knocking your family over in your rush to get to bathroom, and you don't quite make it. The need to pee hits hard and fast and is sometimes triggered by the sound of water or unlocking your front door. Next, frequency is an issue. You have to go every hour. You're constantly on the lookout for the nearest bathroom and you find yourself arranging your road trips around rest stops.

Sound familiar? So, what now? Understand that having children or an enlarged prostate does not make urinary incontinence normal. It's never normal, but it is incredibly common. You should be urinating every 3-4 hours or so, around 6-7 pees in a day. Once in the middle of the night is fine, but we don't want any more than that.

First step is to understand the norms, the next step is to ignore inappropriate urges. You went an hour ago, you don't need to pee. Ignore it by staying calm. Cross your legs. Breathe and kegel (yes guys...you can kegel too). Sit down and distract yourself. The panic to get to the bathroom increases that brain signal to go; so, if you still need to pee, calmly walk to the bathroom, pausing to cross your legs or kegel if you need to. If you pee every hour, set a timer for every 1.5 hours and stick to it. Once it's easy to wait to pee, extend it to every 2 hours and so on. And don't be afraid of your local pelvic PT. We'll work within your comfort level and get you some exercises to help you out.

You really don't have to live a life arranged around your bathroom. Pee to live, don't live to pee.



The Importance of Picking Up Pet Waste

While most pet owners know it is responsible to clean up after their dogs in public spaces, it is important to know the significance of this simple act, especially when visiting a contained space like Willow Bend Dog Park. Pet waste left unattended can lead to a host of problems, affecting not only human health but also our beloved environment in Wells Branch. When picking up your dog's waste, think about the reasons why you are doing it.

Disease Control: Dog waste may contain harmful bacteria, worms, and parasites that pose a threat to both humans and pets. Some of these pathogens can remain in the soil for extended periods, putting the neighborhood at risk of infections.

Watershed Protection: Neglected pet waste can wash into nearby streams, impacting water quality. In areas like ours, where we're part of a vulnerable watershed, maintaining water quality is crucial to safeguarding our ecosystem.

Pest and Rodent Control: Dog waste becomes an attractive food source for rodents in suburban areas. This can lead to rodent infestations, carrying additional health risks for the community.

Cleanliness: Beyond health concerns, stepping into dog waste during a walk is an unpleasant experience. It's unsightly and disrupts the enjoyment of public spaces.

To tackle these issues when visiting Willow Bend Dog Park, follow these tips for cleanup and disposal:


Utilize the District's Mutt Mitt Stations. We have several Mutt Mitt stations with doggie bags available in Willow Bend Dog Park, as well as throughout our parks and trails. If you do not have a bag, take one from these receptacles.

Carry waste bags. To make responsible pet waste cleanup more convenient, consider carrying your own bags when visiting the dog park. Many clip directly on the leash or come with convenient storage options.

Never leave dog feces on the ground. Do not throw doggie bags over the fence or leave them on the ground. Dog waste always poses an environmental hazard. Use a trash receptacle and safely dispose of the waste.

By picking up after pets, you contribute to a cleaner, healthier, and more pleasant space for all. Let's keep the Willow Bend Dog Park safe and beautiful together!



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Wells Branch Wild -

A Community Wildlife Habitat by Jill Douglass What do the United States Department of Agriculture, Texas A&M Forest Service, Texas Fish and Game, the Xerces Society, and the National Wildlife Federation all agree on? Leaving the leaves!! All of these organizations support wildlife, and they all promote using the fallen leaves in your yards as cover, food, and nurseries for animals. With eight trees in my backyard, I do have trouble finding a spot for all those leaves. The leaves on the gravel paths get blown or raked into the flower/landscape beds. Some get piled into a small compost pile. The ones on the grass get mowed and left in place (though shredded leaves will not provide the same cover as leaving them whole). My lawn is small so the mown leaves are few. In the end, a few bags of leaves do make it to the curb to contribute to our community composting. Leaving the leaves provides two basic benefits. First, the leaves provide food, cover, and a place for animals to raise their young. Butterflies, bumble bees, lightning bugs, moths, frogs, and turtles are just a few examples of animals that rely on leaf litter. Without the leaves providing a habitat for insects, many birds will not have food. Second, leaf mulch provides valuable organic matter to your garden. No need to buy mulch if you are using your leaves.

To learn more about how to support wildlife, follow Wells Branch Wild on Facebook and Instagram (both can be found by searching Wells Branch Wild). To date, we have 57 certified wildlife habitats in Wells Branch. We are one-quarter of the way to our goal of 200. If you are interested in certifying or have questions on how to proceed,


Debbie Brown 1952-2023

Register to Vote by Mail

It's a new year, which means that if you want to vote by mail in elections this year, it's time to sign up again! It is a requirement to renew your vote by mail registration every year. If you want to vote by mail in the primaries, your application must be received by February 23.

Who Can Vote By Mail?

According to the Texas State Law, you may vote early by-mail if you are registered to vote and meet one of the following criteria:

- 65 years of age or older on Election Day
- Sick or disabled
- Expected to give birth within three weeks before or after Election Day
- Away from the county of residence on Election Day and during the early voting period
- Confined in jail, but eligible to vote

However, only applicants who are 65 years of age or older or are disabled qualify to apply for the Annual Application for Ballot By Mail (ABBM). Applying annually ensures that qualified voters will receive a mail ballot for ALL elections held during a calendar year. Annual applications may be submitted starting January 1 but must not be submitted later than the 11th day before the first election in which you seek to request a ballot by mail.

If you live in **Travis County**, download and print your application to vote by mail at:

If you live in **Williamson County**, download and print your application to vote by mail at:

https://www.wilcotx.gov/450/Voting-By-Mail

Here are some tips when filling out the Annual Application for Ballot By Mail:

- Make sure you are registered to vote in the county you are applying to vote by mail in.
- You will need to provide your Texas Driver's License Number, Texas Personal ID Number, or your Election Identification Certificate Number – all of which are issued by the Department of Public Safety. If you do not have any of these numbers, you must provide the last four digits of your Social Security Number.
- If you do not remember what number is linked to your voter registration, it is best to provide your Driver's License or ID Number **AND** the last for digits of your SSN.
- Make sure to indicate in Box 4 of the application that you are applying for the "Annual Application". This will ensure that you get a ballot for every election this year.
- Take a photo of your signature on your application, so you will know how to sign you ballot envelopes in a similar way.
- Track your Application for Ballot By Mail and your ballots via the Secretary of State's website.
